AMERICAN HORSE OWNERS WIN MORE MONEY THAN THE ENGLISH

Racing Game Is More Profitable in the United States—Leading Winners.

New York, Jan. 23.—According to statistics, racing is more profitable in the United States than in any other country. The leading winning stables in this country in 1904, for example, were the leading winning stables in England, but was in turn surpassed by the American racing stables owned by the American Bloodstock Company.

The five chief winning stables of America have placed to their credit more than \$150,000 in excess of the amount earned by the produce of the leading five in France, and more than \$25,000 in excess of that of the five leading stables on the English turf.

In France, Ajax, its best 3-year-old, earned more than \$35,000 over the five of France, and by nearly \$300,000 the leading five of England.

CONFIDENT DILLON CAN LOWER RECORD

Trainer M. Sanders Believes Trotting Queen Has Not Yet Shown Her Best.

Memphis, Tenn., Jan. 28.—Millard Sanders, the noted harnessman who drove and developed Lou Dillon, is still confident that the champion trotting mare is capable of reducing her present record of 2:01 1/4 without a pacemaker in front.

Mr. Sanders, while a driver and trainer of prominence for many years, is universally associated with Lou Dillon, the first two-minute trotter. He took the harness queen in her earliest days and developed her into the fastest of trotters in the world.

Since he first bought the dainty daughter of Sidney Dillon before the public her name has never been mentioned without that of Sanders, and vice versa. But the little chestnut has gone out of the hands of the man who "brought her out," and is now in California, while Mr. Sanders has contracted to handle a large stable exclusively.
