

"The same feeling asserted itself in a very signal manner a few years ago, when, in the Bay of Manila, Admiral Dewey, being on the point of engaging the enemy, the British admiral sent word to another admiral that if there were any interference with the Americans his vessels would be found along. side the United States fleet.
