TORTURED BY MEXICANS
nails Drawn Out.

Pittsburg, Aug. 11.—Police officials here have received news of the torturing of two local men who were arrested recently in Mexico City, Mexico, on a charge of robbing a bank messenger. William Moffatt and Edward Makony are the men, and the police here say they were well known to them before leaving for Mexico. Two companions escaped the officers when the Pittsburgers were arrested, and the Mexican police demanded their names. Refusing to betray their companions, the men allege that they were strapped by the wrists to the bars of their cell while the officials, with forceps, tore the nails from their hands. Unable to bear the agony the men gave up the names of their companions. "I suppose," said Captain of Detectives McGough today, "if it were not for the record of the men their torture would cause international complications."

A PROTESTANT PROTEST

Alliance Objects to Proposed Reception by King of Ablegate.

London, Aug. 11.—The council of the Protestant Alliance, that raised such a storm in Parliament and elsewhere at the time King Edward visited the Pope, is again agitated over the announcement that his majesty intends ceremoniously to receive the Papal ablegate, Cardinal Vannutelli, at the forthcoming eucharistic congress in London.

The alliance has sent a memorial to Sir Edward Grey, the foreign secretary, calling attention to this projected violation of the Protestant constitution of the United Kingdom, and urging that steps at once be taken to prevent the King from paying this compliment to the Roman Catholic prelates of Europe and America, who are coming to attend the congress.

Sir Edward has done nothing more than formally acknowledge the receipt of the memorial.

A RECORD YEAR IN WATER TRAFFIC

Canal Statistics Issued by Department—Arrivals and Departures.

Ottawa, Aug. 11.—The canal statistics for the season of navigation of 1907 have just been issued. This is the second time they have been prepared by Mr. J. L. Payne, controller of statistics for the department, and the volume again demonstrated Mr. Payne's ability to make figures interesting. The report points out that the water-borne traffic of the Dominion for the year 1907 was the largest on record. The total volume aggregated 20,543,639 tons, as compared with 10,523,185 in 1906, representing an increase of 95.2 per cent. For the ten-year period the betterment was 13,925,164 tons or 210 per cent. The traffic increased from 9,000,000 tons in 1903 to 20,500,000 tons last year, for comparative purposes. It may be mentioned that the traffic of Canadian railways increased from 47,000,000 tons in 1903 to 63,750,000 tons in 1907. The principal expansion in canal traffic last year was in the business of the Saint Lawrence Canal, which showed an increase of 5,601,943 tons over 1906. During the past decade United States tonnage through the Saint Ste. Marie Canal increased 315 per cent. The betterment in total traffic was 341 per cent, and since the number of passages grew by but 66 per cent, Mr. Payne says it is obvious that the carrying business of the Upper Lakes is rapidly developing a much larger type of steam vessel than has hitherto been in use. In this respect Canadian forwarders appear to be abreast with their American competitors. A change in the method of recording statistics will go into effect this year, whereby a discrimination will be made in the products of either country passing through the canal at Saint Ste. Marie. Hitherto regard has only been had to the nature of the vessels. In future a record will be kept of distinctly Canadian cargoes carried by water, and the information ought to be of considerable value. The new rule applies to all canals as well as to the one at Saint Ste. Marie. Under the new rule it will be possible thereafter to show the tonnage of Canadian grain brought down from the west by water, and to follow its course into the Inland Sea, to the seaboard. The capital expenditure on the canal of Canada up to March 31st, 1907, aggregated \$91,734,718. This is apart from the outlay by the Imperial Government, the total of which is unknown, as the records were lost in the destruction by fire of the Ordnance Office in Montreal in 1852.

5,000 WILDLY TOSS ALL TO RELIGION

Zealots Fight as Mob to Donate \$70,000 to Missionary Cause.

Old Orchard, Me., Aug. 11.—A wild scene of fanatical zealotry, which at times approached the abandon of a street mob, 5,000 men and women, alternately shouting and praying, crying and laughing, gave up nearly \$70,000 in support of the missionary movement of the Christian and Missionary Alliance, of which A. H. Simpson, D. D., of New York, is leader. When it was over many of the congregation had all but begged themselves.

Five hundred delegates are attending the national convention of the association. The record of the audience of 5,000 today was made up of people gathered from all parts of New England.

Soon after Dr. Simpson began his address a wave of hysteria seemed to sweep over the audience. A man started it away in the back of the tabernacle.

"Hallelujah," he shouted, and in ecstasy ran down the aisle, shouting praises to God, turning out his pockets and stripping himself of his valuables as he went. He dropped them into the collection baskets at the altar.

A minute later men and women were fighting for places before the baskets. Men, staid and sedate at other times, pulled out their pocket-books and wallets, removed their rings, watches, and scarf pins, and frantically jostled and shoved for a chance in the struggling mass to drop them in the baskets.

Society women, servants, daughters of the rich and poor alike, pushed and jammed through the crowd, divesting themselves of their earrings, rings, lockets, and other articles of personal adornment of value. Even combs and longnettes were contributed.

Ten Bushels of Valuables.
The hysteria lasted an hour and a half. Then, worn out and most of them without a cent, the people left the church. They left behind them a big basket containing almost ten bushels of valuables.

BEWILDERED BY THE DENSE FOG

Survivors Tell the Story of the Wreck of a Fishing Schooner.

Halifax, Aug. 11.—Leo Farn, of Beppan, Nfld., and Sylvian White, John Mulise and Wm. McEwen, of Eel Brook, Yarmouth, survivors of the crew of the Gloucester fishing schooner Magie and May, which was run down and sunk by the German schooner Freya on Saturday night about sixty miles southeast of Halifax, came ashore from the Freya today. They reported to U. S. Consul-General Wilber, who will forward them to Gloucester immediately. When the fishermen landed this morning they were attired in German sailor uniforms.

Leo Farn said the officers and crew of the German ship did everything possible after the accident to rescue the survivors. He himself caught a lifetime from the Freya, while his three companions were afloat on the booby hatch when rescued.

The schooner left Gloucester Thursday for Arichat, C. B., for men and bait. There was no fog when they left, but on Friday afternoon they ran into the fog, and had it very thick right up to the time of the collision.

On Saturday night about 11:15 they heard a steamer's fog whistle, but could not locate the direction of it. The direction seemed to vary so that it puzzled them. They kept their patent foghorns going and kept a sharp lookout. About a quarter of an hour after the first sound of the steamer's whistle was heard there suddenly loomed up out of the fog the mast-head and port lights of a steamer, and almost immediately the huge hull was in sight. The captain of the Magie and May was on deck at the time, and he saw the light helmsman to starboard the helm, but in a minute from the appearance of the lights the stem of the cruiser struck the schooner near the foremast, staving him in. All hands, thirteen in all, were on the deck of the schooner by the time the collision occurred, but there was no time to lower away a boat.

The schooner sank immediately. Farn was alongside Captain McCathran on the deck as she sank, and the captain went down with his lantern in his hand. Farn is a good swimmer, but he was drawn down by the suction, and thinks he must have been nearly two minutes under water. He was to the utmost of his power to get clear of the suction, and finally succeeded and got to the surface, where he caught a piece of wreckage and ultimately a life line. After the schooner sank he saw nothing of the captain and the rest of the crew, and nine never came to the surface.

"CAFE TRUST" RUN BY ONE PARISIAN

Many American Haunted Places Brought Under Control of Mouriez.

Paris, Aug. 11.—Under the management of one man there has been formed in Paris a combination of restaurants which is of special interest to Americans. Every trans-Atlantic visitor with a well filled purse knows the Cafe de Paris in the Avenue de l'Opera and the Restaurant d'Armenonville in the Bois de Boulogne. For some years these two establishments have been under one management, that of M. Mouriez, who first made his mark in Paris by the way he ran the Hotel Foyat in the Latin Quarter, near the Luxembourg palace.

This is situated far off the usual beat of the visiting American, its restaurant became famous, and every gourmet made a point of going there occasionally to partake of the special dishes associated with its name. Mouriez speedily found a way to the right bank of the Seine, and the Cafe de Paris came into his capable hands. Then D'Armenonville was added to his list, which also included the Restaurant du Helder at Nice and the Hotel de Paris at Trouville.

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Board Will Deal With Carling's Creek

The board of health will grapple with the Carling Creek trouble again on Friday.

This subject comes up regularly, but now the board thinks the beginning of the end is in sight.

The members will inspect the creek potent, failed to attract the custom desired. The experiment of running the place as a hotel was not a success. The French customers did not find them bourgeois prices and the Americans objected to anything that even was called cheap.

M. Mouriez knows better what the Americans want and he is not likely to offend in that respect. During the last two months he hit upon the novel scheme to make the Preatelan better known.

Both Town and Rural Hotels.
As already mentioned, the Abbaye de Theleme was under his control. In the sense of high priced, this is the most exclusive night restaurant in Paris. Every night for a couple of months past its supper tables have been crowded with Americans, who were given every opportunity of learning that when they tired of revelry there they could find fresh fields and pastures new by motoring out to Boise, where the restaurant Preatelan would be opened to receive them.

This was an improvement on the old-time practice of Parisian noctambules of going out to the Preatelan, which once was a dairy farm, to drink milk warm from the cow in the early morning. There is nothing rustic in the new way of doing things at the restaurant Preatelan, although on occasion the cows are brought into the restaurant and milked by the sportive patrons.

In Denmark only the inter-provincial, the inter-communal and the inter-municipal telephones are worked by the state, while the local telephones are worked by private limited companies, to which the state has granted concessions.
