> "That the said Howard Shirley came to his death at Victoria Hospital, London, on or about the 19th day of August, from injuries received in the East London Grand Trunk yards, on the same evening, by being run over by a car, at the end of which car he was working, said car having been struck by cars kicked down by engine from East End. We believe deceased was, from the evidence, in the discharge of his duty, and we further find that while the rules of the Grand Trunk Railway system are full and complete and sufficient to protect life and property, yet we find the Grand Trunk officials sulpably negligent in fail-ing to enforce said rules, and we further recommend that this verdict, together with the evidence and the findings thereon, be sent to the Dominion Railway Commission, requesting their action towards the safeguarding of life and
