## SUING FOR BIG SUM

The Hobbs Defalcation Case Given Hearing at Montreal.

Montreal, Que., Jan. 10.—Hearing of the Dominion customs action against the C. P. R. in connection with the Hobbs defalcations, commenced today. The amount it is sought to recover from the railway is approximately \$240,000, which includes a forfeited bond of \$100,000 and \$89,000 duty on entries to mouth, value of a quarter of a million dollars. The balance made up of money taken by Hobbs. The C. P. R. offers to pay \$18,827, but denies that circumstances call for the forfeit of the bond, and claims there was no intent to defraud on its part.

## WILLIAM WAS MARY

Montreal Woman Masqueraded as a Man for Twenty Years.

Montreal, Jan. 10.—Sent to jail on a charge of vagrancy as William Dubois, the prisoner turned out to be a woman disguised as one of the opposite sex, her right name being Mary Dubois. The woman told the jail officials she had masqueraded as a man for twenty years, performing a man's work, and associating with men as one of their sex. She is now over 60 years of age.

## BREAKWATER FOR PT. BURWELL HARBOR

Marine Inspector Investigates Grounding of the Ashtabula.

Toronto, Jan. 10.—Marine Inspector Capt. G. C. Coles, of Collingwood, who returned last night from Port Burwell, where he has been investigating the grounding of the ferry Ashtabula off the harbor mouth, will recommend to the Department of Marine the construction of a breakwater off the pier to stop the drifting sand, and make the entrance to the port safe at all times.

When interviewed by a Globe reporter at the King Edward Hotel last night, Capt. Coles said that while such a breakwater would cost the department about \$20,000, its construction would render unnecessary the constant dredging every summer to clear the sand from the harbor mouth. He took soundings and inspected the two ranges and the main light, and found everything in first-class shape. The big ferry had been holding a correct course when she ran on the sandbank, and there had been nothing wrong with the lights.

"The day before the Ashtabula struck bottom," said the inspector, "she made the harbor quite easily with a southeast wind blowing. Next day, however," he continued, "the breeze shifted to the southwest, with the result that a solid bank of sand formed right across the mouth of the channel. The piers there run out into Lake Erie almost due south. The breakwater, should the department decide to build it, ought to be constructed in a southeasterly direction, with open water at each end. The breakwater, the trouble. The people of Port Burwell," concluded the inspector, "are very anxious that something be done to make their harbor safe for the entrance of the big vessel."

## TORONTO UNIVERSITY HAS EXCELLENT YEAR

Was One of the Most Successful Seasons in Its History.

Toronto, Jan. 10.—The University of Toronto last year had one of the most successful seasons in its history, according to the annual report of the board of governors to the Provincial Government issued today. The revenue for the year was \$754,504, from which there is to be deducted interest on special trust funds, \$13,349, leaving the net revenue \$741,155, and the expenditure \$729,587. The expenditure increased by \$3,447 over the previous year, the principal item of increase being salaries, which totalled some \$35,000. Six hundred and twenty-six degrees were conferred last year, seven of them being honorary. A further enlargement of the staff is recommended by the president, Dr. Falconer points out that in some respects the need for this is more pressing for women than for men, in as much as the attendance of women students has increased so rapidly that conditions have changed. It cannot be long, he says, until a lady adviser should be appointed for the women in University College, to be a member of the teaching staff, and of sufficiently wide experience to give advice as to the courses of study and methods of work.

## TO PROTECT STRANGERS

A Powerful Organization Formed in New York to Guard Immigration.

New York, Jan. 10.—A new organization, whose object is to protect immigrants coming into this country from petty frauds and impositions, and to assist them in other ways, has been formed in this city. It is called the New York branch of the North American Civic League for Immigrants, which was founded in Boston some two years ago by D. Chauncey Brewer.

The newly-formed body will constitute a permanent bureau of immigration, the Bureau of Immigration, if one is authorized by the state legislature, and it was at the same time to carry on work in the interest of immigrants which a state department could not undertake.

John Hays Hammond is chairman of the new society; Frank Trumbull, vice-president of the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad, is vice-chairman; Frank A. Vanderbilt, of the National City Bank, is treasurer, and Miss Frances A. Keller, member of Governor Hughes' immigration commission, is secretary.

The society will aim to put an end to petty frauds and abuses of immigrants on piers and trains. Unmarried immigrant girls will be watched to see they reach their right destinations. Some attempt will be taken to safeguard the savings of immigrants with private bankers. The abuses of ticket agencies and employment agencies will be fought. Assistance will be given to immigrants in the courts. A central registration bureau may be formed, so that the thousands of immigrant children can be educated. An attempt will be made to change conditions in the labor camps up-state, where thousands of immigrant aliens are working.

The committee will operate in time to put into effect a plan for a wider distribution of aliens, so as to relieve congestion in the large cities. An attempt will be made to induce the railroads leading out of the city to establish immigrant agents or agencies. These would keep the com-

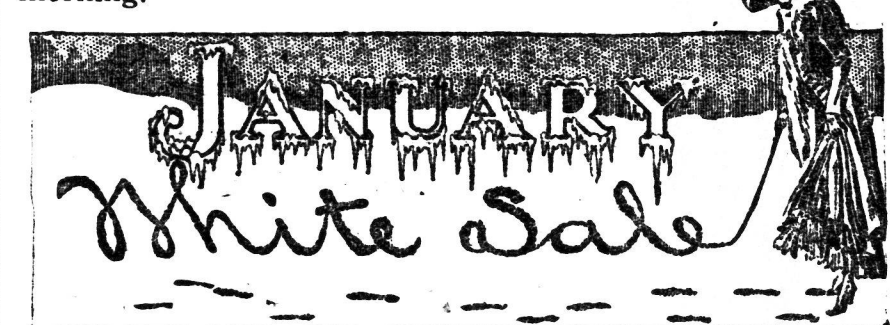

### A DESPERATE ACT

Yarmouth, N. S., Businessman Suicides By Leaping Into Sea.

Yarmouth, N. S., Jan. 10.—When the steamer Boston arrived from Boston Saturday the announcement was made that Frederick C. Ryerson, aged 50, a Yarmouth businessman, had jumped overboard on Friday night, and was not seen afterward, although a boat was launched immediately.

When Ryerson boarded the steamer here he told the American inspector that he was going to see one of the officers, but instead of returning to the wharf he sailed with the ship. The American authorities in Boston would not permit him to land. He was despondent when leaving here, and his friends feared some desperate act.

## A PEER'S VALUABLE GIFT

Presents a Fine Municipal Building to His Native Town.

Lancaster, Jan. 11.—By the gift of Lord Ashton, Lancaster is placed in the front rank of boroughs with up-to-date municipal buildings. The block, which has been erected during the past three years in Dalton Square, is of classic design and rectangular in plan. Every department of the corporation has its headquarters under one roof, including the police and fire station. The tower over the principal staircase is 180 feet high. The total cost is stated to be £155,000, every penny of which has been borne by his lordship, excepting the site, which had been previously purchased for £7,000. A statue of Queen Victoria faces the town hall, this being also a present from Lord Ashton to his native town. Mr. E. W. Mountford, the architect, died before seeing the results of his labor completed, the latter duty falling on Mr. F. Daré Clapham, his partner.

The formal opening ceremony was performed by Lord Ashton, who said that as a native he desired to see Lancaster possessed of municipal buildings worthy of its traditions. ## SUIT FOR \$30,000,000 WON BY PA. SUGAR CO.

End Action Against American Sugar Refining Company at Philadelphia.

Philadelphia, Jan. 10.—The suit of the Pennsylvania Sugar Refining Company against the American Sugar Refining Company to recover \$30,000,000 damages, was officially ended today, when Judges Willison and Audenried handed down a decree in the common pleas court authorizing George H. Earle, jun., receiver for the local concern, to accept terms of settlement offered by the American Sugar Refining Company. The bondholders of the Pennsylvania Company will receive \$750,000 in cash and a note held against the local plant by the American Company for \$1,250,000 will be surrendered with its accompanying collateral. The suit was instituted by Receiver Earle, who alleged that through the loan of \$1,250,000 to Adolph Segal, promoter of the Pennsylvania Com-

pany, the American Sugar Refining Company prevented the opening of the plant of the Pennsylvania Company. The suit was instituted under the Sherman anti-trust law. Mr. Earle is directed by the court to pay from the cash to be secured from the American Sugar Refining Company \$115,000, to Frank S. Black, George Gordon Battle, H. Sawdell Marshall, and John W. Hutchinson, all of New York, who acted as counsel for the receiver when the case was on trial in New York.
