SIDE LIGHTS ON
MANY SPORTSDESPITE EFFORTS OF KANE
LONDON BEAT OTTAWA 2 TO 1

Locals Scored First Victory in Big Series After Bobby Heck Pitched in Sensational Manner—Kubat Hammered Out in Fifth, But Kane Holds London Hitless.

Frank "Licorice" Shaughnessy got an idea along about the fifth inning in yesterday's game when London was leading by 2 to 0, and introduced a big lengthy guy named Kane into the contest. Mr. Kane filled the vacancy caused by the retirement of "Lefty" Kubat, who had received too much chastisement at the hands of the local hitters to survive very long. This Kane person made his presence felt right off the reel, and after speedily retiring London in the fifth inning sent a run had been scored off Kubat, he went to bat and proceeded to mail the pill for three cushions. In this dire attempt to squeeze a run across he was aided and abetted by another one of the "licorice-lights" named Crowder, who managed to get a single on a ball that bounded over Dunlop's head. Mr. Kane scored the lone run that Ottawa was credited with by the official scorer. That was not all Mr. Kane did. That was all that really mattered, however. In the eighth inning he again poled one of Bobby Heck's slants for three pillows, but this time died a lonely death on the sacks. Mr. Crowder and Mr. Shaughnessy being unable to deliver. Besides all this he retired the London team in order in each of the innings he pitched, and did not allow a hit. London eventually won by the score of 2 to 1, but had Kane lived into the proceedings no end of things might have happened to put a different complexion on the result.

Heck in Rare Form.

It was a big Friday crowd that saw Bobby Heck and this London team thwart the purpose of Mr. Kane in his attempt to win the game all by himself for Ottawa. Heck has not pitched better form since he joined the team than he did yesterday. The Senators tried a little licorice on the ball, but Umpire Davis spotted it, and the soiled pill was thrown out of the game as a result. Thus it was that the Senators were able to go the even tenor of his unforced way and hand the league leaders a regular beating, one that has been coming to them for some time from the Syracuse southpaw.

We repeat: It was a big crowd, being Ladies' Day, and the last one of the season at that, the fair sex turned out in large numbers and appeared to enjoy the proceedings. All the stands were taken up, and it was estimated that about 3,000 people were present.

Big Fellows Didn't Count.

All those big fellows of the Ottawa team, those fellows, Shaughnessy, Rogers, Renfor, etc., that we have been reading about lately, didn't cut much dash in this first meeting of the pennant aspirants. Neither Shaughnessy nor Rogers got to first base during the whole conflict, Heck striking out the big manager once to the great delight of the natives in the stands. In the eighth inning Shaughnessy injected a flock of pinch-hitters in Pete Powers and Ed Renfor in an effort to inveigle Kane off third base with the tying run, but the attempt failed to make the grade.

London got to Kubat early. In the first inning three hits were made off him, but no runs counted. Bierbauer got as far as the plate, but the ball beat him to it, and he was called out, retiring the side. In the third inning three more hits by Bierbauer, Stewart and Dunlop, the same trio who had singled safely in the first frame, resulted in one run. Both rallies came with two duffers down. In the fourth inning, Smith caught at the plate, trying to score from second on a single to left. It was a foolish attempt, as Rogers had the ball as Smith was rounding third.

The run that eventually proved the winning tally came in the fifth. Matteson singled and Bierbauer sacrificed. Stewart hit a long drive to Shaughnessy, the Ottawa centrefielder, his managing to knock it down with his gloved hand. Matteson was held at third. This was where Kane intervened in Ottawa's behalf, and Dunlop tried to pull the squeeze play. He missed the ball once, and Matteson was hurried to the plate. He turned to go away to the plate, and threw wild to Bullock, and Lage threw wild to Bullock to catch him. Matteson scored on the error.

Bobby Heck held the Senators to six.

RALPH DE PALMA WON
THE COBE TROPHY RACE

Joe Dawson Was Only Slightly in the Rear, However, in 302-Mile Grind.

Elgin, Ill., Aug. 29.—Two veteran drivers shared the honors of today's road race for the Cobe trophy—Ralph de Palma and Joe Dawson. The former won the 302 miles grind in 4:31:56, but Dawson was only slightly behind, going the distance in 4:39:52. De Palma's average, 68.8 miles per hour, is slightly better than the previous record for this event, which is an annual preliminary to the Elgin National race, with 15 big cars, tomorrow.
