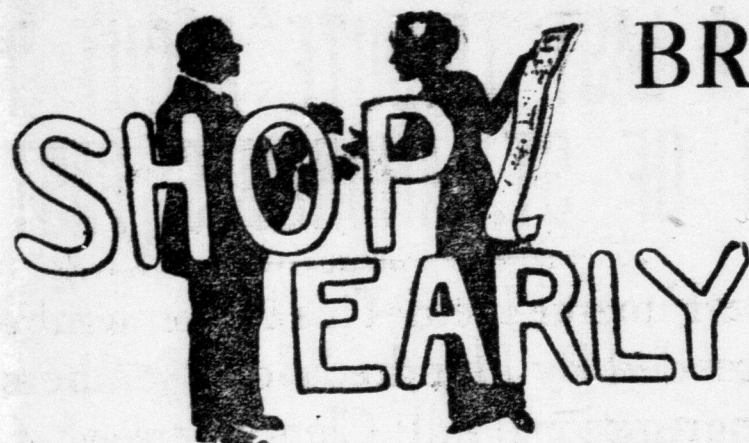

OBJECTS TO NOISES OF THE "ROARIN' GAME"

Strathroy Lady Takes Action
Against Strathroy Curling Club.

Complaining that the noise made by members of the Strathroy Curling Club while playing the "roarin' game" was a source of annoyance and damage to her, Mrs. Jennie Taylor, of that town, who owns property next door to the rink, had recourse to law to see if something could not be done to have it stopped. She also alleged that snow from the roof continually slid on her

property and was the cause of much damage. Accordingly she took action against Messrs. W. P. Dymond, A. E. Gillan and W. H. Freese, directors of the Strathroy Curling Club, to restrain them from making undue noise in playing their games, and also to recover damages alleged to have been caused to her property.

The case came up at the non-jury sittings of the county court, but was adjourned, and was heard before Judge Macbeth Wednesday afternoon.
