## AUSTRIANS TRYING TO KEEP ITALY FRIENDLY

Foreign Minister Confers With Ambassador—Pope Sees Austria's Ruin.

London, Jan. 22.—The Daily News correspondent, telegraphing from Rome, says:  
"Duke D'Aviano, Italian ambassador at Vienna, yesterday had a conference of three hours' duration with Baron Von Buri, the new Austro-Hungarian foreign minister. The Austrian newspapers attach the greatest importance to Baron Von Buri's policy, and hint that he desires to prevent Rumania and Italy from intervening in the war."

"We do not think Britain will reach her goal, but Germany will do all she can to see that the commercial war will be continued."

Rome, Jan. 22.—The number of injured who have been brought here from the earthquake zone has been increased to fifteen thousand.  
A pitiful case which has been brought to the notice of the authorities is that of a woman who was extricated after ten days burial in the ruins of the town of Ortucchio, southeast of Avezzano. During that time she saw her seven children die around her, one by one, and her grief over their loss and the fact that she was powerless to help them has driven her mad.  
Mrs. Irti has to be constantly watched, because she springs at others of the wounded in the belief that they are persecuting her. Her husband is working in America, and a few days before the earthquake he received from him 3,000 francs (\$600), which thus far has not been recovered.

## Dacia Delayed
