VOLUNTEERS SLOW TO ANSWER CALL OF RECRUITING AGENTS

Officers Hopeful Results Will
Show Later.

CAMPAIGNS VERY QUIET
No Objectionable Features But
Soldiers Are Sometimes
Insulted.

Stirring recruiting appeals, lively
band music and the individual efforts
of a large staff of recruiters are hav-
ing no startling effects on recruiting
at the Western Fair. The officers,
however, are still hopeful that results
will be produced later when many of
the prospects will have had time to
think over the arguments advanced
during fair week.

"We are having our chief difficulty
with men from outside the city,"
states the recruiting officer for one
of the corps. "Some of them seem to
think that because they are working
fifty acres of land they are doing more
for their country than the men who
are fighting in France. The chaps
overseas are risking their lives, while
those back here are following quite a
safe employment and making money
from it."

Some Insulted.
All the recruiting campaigns are
quiet ones and contain none of the
objectionable features which marked
some earlier in the year. Many of
the recruiters, however, meet with
personal insults when they attempt to
carry out the duties to which they are
assigned.

Although men are urgently needed,
the physical standard is being strictly
maintained and only those recruits
measuring up to all requirements
are being accepted.

Highlanders Popular.
The campaign which is attracting
the most attention is undoubtedly that
of the 241st Scottish Borderers. The
party is composed of over twenty of
the battalion, including the pipe band.
Through the impromptu concerts
which are held throughout the day,
nearly every person in the grounds
is appealed to.

CALL MADE IN ONTARIO FOR NEW FORESTRY UNIT

250 Men Asked From This Province for
242nd Battalion.

Ontario has been asked to assist
in supplying men for yet another unit.
The latest call is from the newly au-
thorized 242nd Forestry Battalion. This
battalion is authorized to recruit all
over the Dominion, and is asking for
only 250 recruits from Ontario. Seventy
of these have already been secured,
fifty of them being a nucleus which
was supplied by the 238th Forestry
Battalion, which was recruited above
strength. The same phenomenal suc-
cess which marked the recruiting for
that unit will, it is expected, continue
with the 242nd.

The work of the battalion does not
carry with it any of the regular haz-
ards of war, the men being recruited
for the purpose of working in the for-
ests of England and Southern France
to keep the boys in the trenches sup-
plied with suitable material for de-
fences. It is expected that many On-
tario men who for various reasons
cannot join a regular fighting unit
will recognize the opportunity of ser-
vice offered by the battalion, and will
lose no time in taking advantage of
the opening.

The battalion is commanded by Col.
J. D. White, who is a widely-experi-
enced military man, and an ideal com-
manding officer. Before accepting his
present command he was manager of
the Borden Pulp and Paper Company
of Ontario. The other officers are
also competent men for the class of
work required, and several of them
are returned soldiers. Capt. W. B.
Hagaman of Markham will look after
the recruiting for London and St.
Catharines, and until an office is
opened here recruits will be received
at the armories.

NUMEROUS APPLICANTS FOR RAILWAY BATTALION

Unit Will Be Sent Overseas at Early
Date.

The word that the 239th Overseas
Railway Construction Corps is billed
for overseas at an early date has
aroused in numerous applicants to the
local recruiting office at 237 Dundas
street. This corps is not to be kept
in Canada until fully up to strength,
but is to be sent over by companies,
two leaving at end of month or early
in October, and the remainder as filled.
This is because each company is a
complete unit, capable of undertaking
a whole contract by itself, from sur-
veying and instrument work, plotting
and grading and constructing, running
the trains and supplying its own mechanics
and fitters. The stay in England will
be short, as no additional training is
required of it. All the military train-
ing that is given this battalion is given
in Canada, at Valcartier Camp, and
consists merely of squad, platoon and
company drill. Men who can do a
day's work, and especially teamsters
are particularly needed. The experi-
ence gained in serving in the 238th
Battalion will be invaluable in after
life.

CLERGY WILL ASSIST IN RECRUITING CALL FOR FALL CAMPAIGN

CANVAS FALL FAIRS

Speakers Will Make Direct
Appeals to the
Visitors.

CAMP BORDEN, Sept. 14-- Repre-
sentatives of the Clerical Patriotic As-
sociation and the recruiting staff wait-
ed on Col. G. H. Williams, chief re-
cruiting officer, today. They wish to
co-operate with the recruiting staff in
an appeal this fall to secure men for
the colors.

At the commencement of the cam-
paign all the pulpits will be devoted
to recruiting sermons, and it is hoped
thus to reach members of the church
and others who have not as yet offered
themselves for service.

The big feature of the campaign,
however, will be the canvassing of all
the fall fairs in Ontario. Arrangements
will be made with the speakers who
will make direct appeals to the visitors
there, and it is hoped to secure a
large number of men before the winter
prevents active outdoor work in this
line.

Twelve Bands in Competition.
Twelve bands from Camp Borden
have entered in the Battle fair com-
petition on Tuesday. Six bands have
been entered in each of the two classes.
In Class A, Bandmaster G. W. Wilson,
of the 112nd London's Own Battalion
has a fine field of musicians to com-
pete against, as there are four To-
ronto bands entered and the 157th
Simcoe also.

In Class B there are four Western
Ontario bands. The 118th Kitchener
Band is favorite, but Bandmaster F.
Hodder of the 14th Lambtons, Band-
master E. Milne of the 10th Perth,
and Bandmaster W. Pearson of the
18th Kent, will also be strong con-
tenders.

The non-commissioned officers of
the 118th Kitchener Battalion will be
examined next Monday by a board of
fifteen officers, of which Major H. H.
Madill, I. C. M. D. No. 2, will be pres-
ident, and Major R. E. McNeil and
Capt. H. A. Fraser, of the 118th, mem-
bers.

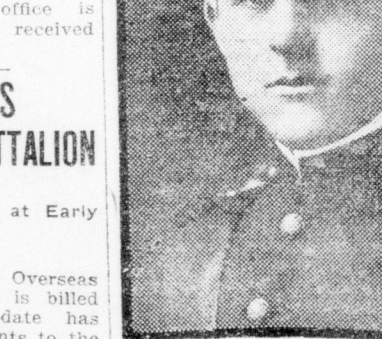
