

TORONTO, Sept. 8.—Copies of the complete Sutherland report condemning the hydro radial project have been handed to the press, and contain a lot of details not covered in the summary recently handed out by Premier Drury. A feature of the report is a letter from G. T. Clarkson auditor, to the attorney-general, in which he sets forth the various sums invested by the hydro-electric commission of Ontario in the various radial propositions. The letter says in part:

"While only \$413,620 had been interested in the Port Credit-St. Kitstline, the province had guaranteed bords to the extent of \$11,360,363, of which \$1,200,000 stood deposited on October 31, 1920, with the Bank of Montreal as security for the payment of advances of \$100,000."

On or about December 28, 1920, a further loan of \$100,000 was obtained from the bank, which then was owed \$500,000 with the \$1,200,000 of bonds as security. The additional loan was secured to repay \$313,620 for radial purposes which had been expended out of moneys belonging to the power undertaking.
