

CLAIMS SOULS TRAVEL IN SLEEP

Dr. Frank L. Riley, Los Angeles Psychologist, Explains Theory.

Can "Will" Direction and Place Before Falling Asleep.

LOS ANGELES, April 13. — The thrill of an airship poised, the flight of a bird on the wing, twinkling stars in the night—are as nothing when compared to the freedom of a soul that leaves its body in sleep and delves into the secrets of the unknown.

Dr. Frank L. Riley, widely known scientific investigator and scholar of things occult, who says that searchers for fundamental truths are proving to their own satisfaction that the soul is a tangible thing and has a vital existence with power to function both within or outside the body.

Dr. Riley's personal experiences long ago convinced him that his soul does travel into the unknown world while his body is in sleep, and an incident which occurred last week in a public lecture room took on the form of scientific and material proof to witnesses who saw what transpired.

Woman's Dream.
"This is a most amazing coincidence," said a woman to Dr. Riley, at the close of the lecture. "Last night I dreamed I was at the bedside of a friend who was very ill, and while trying to comfort her you also came into the room. Your image was so strongly impressed upon me that I would have known you again anywhere I saw you. You seemed to be a relative of my friend and were there to try to relieve her suffering. I do not understand it."

"You really did see me," said Dr. Riley, "it was at the bedside of my sister. She had been very ill and I went to sleep in my own home thinking about her. During the night I slipped out of my body and went over to be near her, but as I have grown accustomed to my soul traveling at night I thought little of the incident."

"But I was not there," said the woman, "I was in my own home." "Your soul was there," replied Dr. Riley. "It had traveled to the side of your friend while your body slept, and you were conscious of its activities only as a dream. Had you known more of the spirit realm you would have realized that your soul was traveling instead of thinking the incident a dream."

The soul leaves the body of every one in sleep," says Dr. Riley. "Men who have devoted their lives to

psychic research say that all souls are out of the body in sleep, although few people realize it.

"It is very simple to direct a soul on its mission before going to sleep, and people who are familiar with the radiograph which is now attracting world-wide attention can easily understand the sympathetic relationship existing between a man's soul and his body. It is similar to that which exists between the broadcasting and the receiving radiophone. As long as the attachment is perfect and the sympathetic vibrations unbroken the message will go direct. "The soul returns to the body naturally, because of the magnetic attraction between them—or the 'silver cord' as it is referred to in the Bible. Through these demonstrations people are beginning to understand the teachings of the Master in reference to taking up the body and laying it down."

Direction Possible.
"It is possible to direct the soul much more easily than the body and with greater satisfaction. It draws itself out of the body substance and can glide into infinite space."

"A vivid experience of the Countess of Tankerville, when she was Lady Bennett, is identical with that of the soul of one leaving the body when in sleep. The Countess of Tankerville is an advanced student along spiritual lines. She was very ill and seemed to have breathed her last. Relatives standing by her bedside thought she was dead, but as they silently waited in grief the countess was having a very strange experience."

Soul Crosses Ocean.
"She thought her soul was crossing a vast ocean and as she drew near the port she saw half a dozen friends who had died many years before, standing on the quay ready to receive her. She realized that the final separation between her soul and her body had not yet taken place. An intense yearning to fly flashed through her. "I will not die yet," she declared vehemently and with a mighty surge of will she paused in her flight and a moment more she was returning to her body."

Radiant Beings Appear.
"When that occurred she lost sight of the people on the shore and three radiant beings appeared. There was no light or shade in their gossamer garments, but a light from somewhere within seemed to radiate through them, enveloping them with a wondrous beauty. As they faded from her vision she wondered if they were guardian angels come to her assistance—and then she returned to the consciousness of her grief-stricken family."

And continuing, Dr. Riley said: "The appearance of Napoleon at his home on the Isle of Corsica almost simultaneously with the moment of his death at St. Helena, is a matter of history, and it illustrates the point that a soul can materialize itself before the final separation has taken place."

BYNG TO WEAR BUSINESS SUIT

Secretary of Governor-General Writes Asking Citizens To Do Likewise.

Wants Top Hats, Tuxedos and Evening Gowns Left At Home.

Dress suits, tuxedos, fancy vests, evening gowns, top hats, gold-headed walking sticks, ivory cigarette cases, etc., are absolutely passe during the visit in London of the governor-general of Canada, His Excellency Lord Byng of Vimy.

Such was the substance of a message received Friday afternoon from Captain Balfour, Lord Byng's secretary. Consistent with the policy announced by the governor-general when he commenced his tour at Ottawa, citizens, including His Worship Mayor Wilson, the aldermen and all other civic dignitaries are asked not to adopt any extraordinary measures to insure a welcome for the visitors. Lord Byng and his staff will assume, the secretary notifies the local authorities, plain business attire, and expect that Londoners will do likewise. Therefore, it follows that those who arrive for the various functions in silk toppers and cutaways will tend to overshadow in grandeur the vice-regal members themselves.

KILLED IN GUN BATTLE

Former Irish Volunteer Believed Victim of Factional Vengeance.

NEW YORK, April 14.—Vengeance for his alleged betrayal of the Irish cause was ascribed by police as a possible motive for the shooting of Patrick Connors in a gun battle with six other men in Central Park West, last night.

Connors was wounded five times and is not expected to live. A former member of the Irish volunteer army, he was sent to jail by the British government for his activities. While in prison he is alleged to have revealed information which reacted to the detriment of the movement. Upon his release, about a year ago, he immigrated to the United States. Members of his family, police said, admitted that Patrick had received a number of threatening letters within the last few months.

LAUNCH TWO NEW BOATS ON HURON

Goderich Fishermen Add to Fleet Speedy Craft Built During Winter.

CEREMONIES OBSERVED

"Margaret MacDonald" and "John Graham" Are 33 and 36 Feet in Length.

GODERICH, April 14.—The two new fishing boats which were built at the harbor this winter were launched this week with the usual ceremony. They are the largest fishing boats in use here, one being 33 feet long and the other 36 feet, and are built to develop a greater speed than any of the others.

The Margaret MacDonald, owned by MacDonald Bros., was launched on Wednesday afternoon, the young lady after whom the boat was named breaking the bottle over it as it slid into the water.

The boat will carry four sails, two masts, a jib and a main topsail. The two masts and the engine, which will develop sixteen horsepower, will be put in place later. The Graham boat, which is named after the builder, John Graham, was also launched. She has a sixteen horsepower engine, the type used in Lake Erie fisheries. The Birmingham's hoist was used to lift her into the water to avoid the risk of swamping. This boat has only one spar and sail.

Both boats are very firm and smart-looking, and are important additions to the fishing fleets at this port.

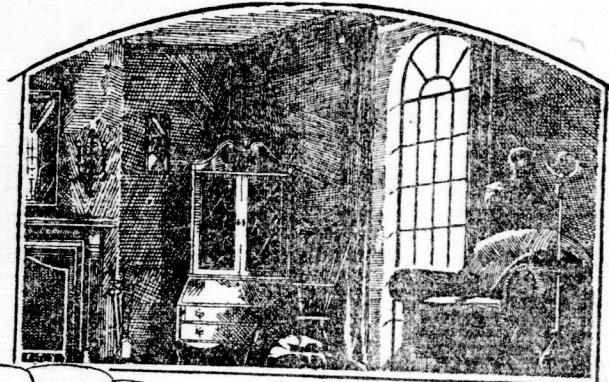
TRUSTEES ATTEND MEETING.

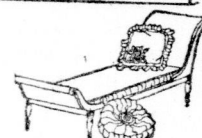
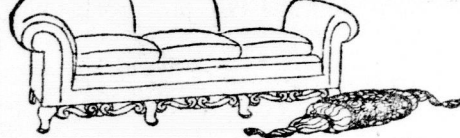

Regale Lloyd George, While on Recent Trip to Wales, With Stories of His Father.

CRICCIETH, Wales, April 14.—Premier Lloyd George is never so happy as when swapping stories about his boyhood days with old cronies of his native Wales.

During his last visit here he gave a tea party to 19 ancients who were his father's pupils at Troedyrall school more than 60 years ago. The senior "old boy" was John Jones, 91, who still works as a carpenter. Next to Jones was William Davies, an assistant teacher under the premier's father, who testified to the latter's handiness with the cane on occasions. Another guest was John Williams, now blind, who used to carry love messages between the premier's father and mother.

Tell Tales of Father.
The "old boys" told their best many stories of his father he had never heard before, and all were in the best of spirits. Old John Jones made the premier roar with laughter by the quaint way he told a story of the local indignation many years ago, when a minister preached from a text which another minister had used the previous Sunday.

Mr. Lloyd George always tries to take things easy while here, but members of his cabinet and newspapermen seldom let a day go by without appropriating part of his time.

Chief Pleasures.
Getting up late in the morning, working in the garden, and listening to Welsh music are his chief pleasures

during his visits, and when the weather is threatening he sits on his covered balcony wrapped in a gaudy shawl. "The day," he remarked on his last visit, "that I must go back to school in a few days. They say I am playing truant. Yet they all followed me, including the newspapers. I wish they would leave me alone for at least a fortnight; it would be better for them, and certainly better for me."

STATESMEN TO ATTEND MONTREAL CELEBRATION

Members of Dominion Cabinet To Be Present at Board of Trade Centenary Anniversary.

MONTREAL, April 14.—When the local board of trade holds its centenary anniversary banquet April 28, the celebration will be attended by at least two premiers, six members of the Dominion cabinet and several members of the Provincial cabinet and probably by representatives of other provincial governments. Further, the British board of trade will also be officially represented.

Premier Taschereau of Quebec, and it is hoped also, Right Hon. Sir Charles Fitzpatrick, lieutenant-governor, will be present, and Hon. Jacob Nicol, provincial treasurer.
