Stage Struck.

One of the most gorgeous bits of natural color photography ever seen on the screen appears in Gloria Swanson's latest Paramount picture, Stage Struck, which is the feature picture at the Capitol today and tomorrow.

Gowns, gowns, gowns and spectacular scenery form a fitting setting to the beauty of one of the screen's most accomplished actresses. From the ball-room scene of the poor maid's dream to the embarrassing situation of making love under impossible circumstances, Miss Swanson carries her part with consummate ease and perfection.

The opening banquet scenes in the king's palace give Miss Swanson an opportunity to display the wonderful gowns she knows so well how to wear. The settings are sumptuous both in design and coloring. The rapidly shifting costumes and unusual scenes are humorously mystifying until they fade into the restaurant scene.

Every small town has its comedy waitress who kids and is kidded by everybody. That is Gloria. Humor and pathos are cleverly mixed in the pathetic attempt of the little waitress to gain fame and the love of the uninterested Orme, the flap-jack king.

The picture is particularly interesting in the fact that it is one of the first of the new natural-color pictures which

so effectively offset the more spectacular scenes. Both in the opening scenes and at the end natural coloring is used with striking effect.

Alice Day, in Cold Turkey, a Mack Sennet comedy, proves an exceptionally good laugh-maker. The Capitol Current Events fills out the bill, with Harry Carter, the Capitol's singing usher, also adding to the enjoyment of a splendid program.

The Only Thing, starring Eleanor Boardman and Conrad Nagel, appearing at Loew's the remainder of the week, is a poignant human drama full of romance, passion and conquest. The story is one written by Elinor Glyn directly for the screen, and the cast has been perfectly chosen for the various parts. Miss Boardman, as a princess,

is beautiful, and her grace, charm and dignity gives reality to this role. Nagel, as Harry Vane, the Duke of Chevenix, plays the part of an Englishman who is sent to the kingdom of Chelkia to represent the King of England at a marriage ceremony between the beautiful princess and the aged and ugly king.

He himself falls in love with the princess, and attempts to frustrate the marriage, but the princess refuses to be unfaithful to her country, and pleads with him not to take her away. A revolution removes the obstacle and throws the lovers into a series of thrilling adventures, which end in a very charming scene on board ship with all unpleasantness behind them.

Pickard's trained seals, who do most everything but talk, form what is perhaps the leading act of vaudeville. Hinkle and May are also good in a singing and patter act. Love Nest, a skit of difficulties in love meets with

great approval.

Lloyd Hamilton, in Framed, provides real funny comedy. Loew's Sport Revue fills out a bill of exceptional worth.

PASTOR IS INDUCTED

Former Toronto Minister Takes Charge of Presbyterian Church at Avonton.

Stratford, Dec. 17.—Rev. J. G. McKay, formerly of Mimico, was inducted in the Avonton Presbyterian church this afternoon. Rev. W. J. Walker of St. Mary's officiated as moderator. Rev. W. McIntosh of Milverton preached. Rev. Geo. W. Rowland of Knox church, Stratford, addressed the minister, and Rev. H. L. Bennie of Mitchell addressed the people. Rev. Geo. P. Duncan of St. Andrew's church took part in the induction prayers. In addition to the Avonton charge, Mr. McKay will have charge of the minority congregations of Motherwell and Avonbank.

FR. JAMES MUGAN, 70, DIES IN CITY HOSPITAL

Veteran Priest Had Been in Charge of Several Parishes in Western Ontario.

Rev. Father James Mugan, who was born in Tilsburg, Ont., nearly 70 years ago, and who was ordained to the priesthood in London diocese 40 years ago, died in St. Joseph's Hospital yesterday afternoon.

Father Mugan was stationed after his ordination at Graysdale, in Huron county. Subsequently he was parish priest in

priest in Corunna, Raleigh, and finally Ridgeway, from which he retired because of illness eight years ago. Since that time he had lived at Mount St. Joseph and St. Joseph's Hospital, in London.

The funeral will be held Saturday morning at St. Peter's cemetery after requiem high mass is solemnized at St. Peter's cathedral at 10 o'clock by Rt. Rev. Mgr. McKeon. Priests from various parts of the diocese will attend.

DIES AT AGE OF 65.

TWENTY-NINE ROTARY FLAGS ARE NOW IN STRATFORD

Stratford, Dec. 17.—A delegation from the Kitchener Rotary club today placed in the custody of the local body 29 flags, representing 29 countries in which Rotary is now thriving. An address on international relations was given by Rev. G. P. Duncan of St. Andrew's Presbyterian church.

The flags, which are the property of the Guelph Rotary club, will be held here for a month and then passed on to another club in this district. The flags were originally presented to the Guelph club by graduates of the O. A. C. who are now prominent in different parts of the United States. Since their presentation to the Guelph club three of the countries have taken up Rotary, bringing the total up to 32.
