Cut twelve large cucumbers in half-inch strips, remove seeds, sprinkle with two tablespoons of salt, let stand for half an hour and drain Slice four medium-sized onions, add to the cucumbers, pour on two cups of vinegar, and a cup of sugar, then add four tablespoons of mixed spices that have been boiled together for five minutes. Let stand for an hour. The relish is then ready for use.

Mustard Pickles.

One-half peck tomatoes, about four large heads celery, one quart onions, one large head cabbage, six red peppers, six green peppersmove the seeds-chop very fine, mix and pack in layers, sprinkling each layer with salt. Allow this to remain over night. In the morning drain well, put in a kettle, cover with vinegar, and add one pound brown sugar, ne-quarter pound mustard, onequarter pound mustard ounce celery seed. Mix all well to-gether, and boil one hour, or until it looks transparent. Seal in airtight jars and keep cool.
