The official estimate for British Columbia, forwarded to the agent igneral in London by the provincial mineralogist on January 5, gave the product of this province as considerably in excess of \$26,000,000 for 1906, while the total for Ontario as given in the despatch mentioned is only \$22,221,808, a difference in favor of British Columbia of 25 per cent.

Misleading Figures Coming to silver, it has to be admitted that Ontario has passed this province for the present, owing to the wonderfully rich veins of the Cothe wonderfully rich veins of the Co-balt camp, but the figures given in the despatch that the product of Ontario was 5,357,330 ounces, value \$3,543,089 is misleading. The estimated output of British Columbia was 3,470,000 ounces valued at \$2,203,000. This is calculated at 63.5 cents per ounce, the average market price for the year, less 5 per cent. 
