RAILWAY MEN TO SEEK INCREASE

Restoration of Last Year's Conditions to Follow Cleveland Meeting.
Toronto, Aug. 11.—The attention of Canadian railway employees is now fixed upon Cleveland, where a conference of Brotherhood representatives is in session arranging for a wage movement to include the railways of Canada.

A number of Canadian challenges are in attendance at the Cleveland meeting, which is made up of all the general chairmen of the Order of Railway Conductors and the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen.

From the conference there is to be a movement for a reduction of conditions which prevailed before the general reduction was made in Canada and the U. S. last year ago.

SEVERAL CONVICTIONS.
A Fredericton dispatch to the Globe says: Chief Game Warden L. A. Caplan has been advised of several convictions which have been secured in Madawaska County for infringement of the game regulations. Also in connection with violations of the fire regulations. Before Magistrate Conroy at St. Leonard's on Friday one fine of \$20 was imposed against a resident of the county for setting fire without a permit. Another resident received a fine of \$10 for similar offense, while three parties were fined \$10 each for carrying firearms in closed season in the woods.

CLAIM OF \$12,000 AGAINST STEAMER
Seizure of Steamship Which Hit Morrissey Bridge Expected Monday.

Bathurst, N. B., Aug. 11.—The North-Struck and damaged the drawbridge of the Morrissey Bridge across the Miramichi river at Newcastle will be liable for \$12,000 by the Province of New Brunswick. Premier Vautour said this morning upon his return from Fredericton.

That is the sum which the Premier says W. M. Ryan, of St. John, solicitor for the Government, has been authorized to name in the proceedings he has been instructed to take through the Admiralty Court. The seizure is expected to be made by the Sheriff of Northumberland County at Douglastown on the Miramichi, where the Woodlums is completing its loading.

The Premier said that a ferry service on the Miramichi river at Newcastle was being inaugurated immediately.

GUIDES SET NO FOREST FIRES

Game Clubs in New Brunswick Set Record for Forest Protection.

Ottawa, Aug. 13.—The private fish and game clubs of Quebec and New Brunswick set a record in forest fire prevention that may prove an object lesson to other clubs of the world, according to the Canadian Forestry Association.

Scarcely one fire in either province is attributable to the professional guides and the thousands of experienced sportsmen who are members of these organizations. The right club rules and additional carelessness of guides and members with all forms of fires while in or near a forest has proved most effective. On the other hand, the fires set by amateur fishermen and campers this year have been numerous and destructive.

Camp fires, unextinguished, lit cigarettes, thrown into piles of leaves and other forms of reckless conduct have destroyed hundreds of square miles of the finest forest areas in Eastern Canada.

In a recent interview Dr. C. D. Howe, President of the Canadian Forestry Association, said: "We Canadians are spending less than a cent an acre as an insurance rate on forest fires than the United States. We are willing to invest more money in it."
