Canada's peculiar natural advantages placed the taxation most heavily where it shall rest, upon the man of means. The customs returns showed that one-third of the total imports for home consumption were free of duty and also that more than 200 articles of raw material came: in duty free. The United States had during the past 21 years paid an average of \$6.64 per head and the average of Canada was \$1.70 per head less; that is, that were Canada's taxation as heavy as that of the United States she would have paid for customs and excise \$182,000,000 more than she has paid.
