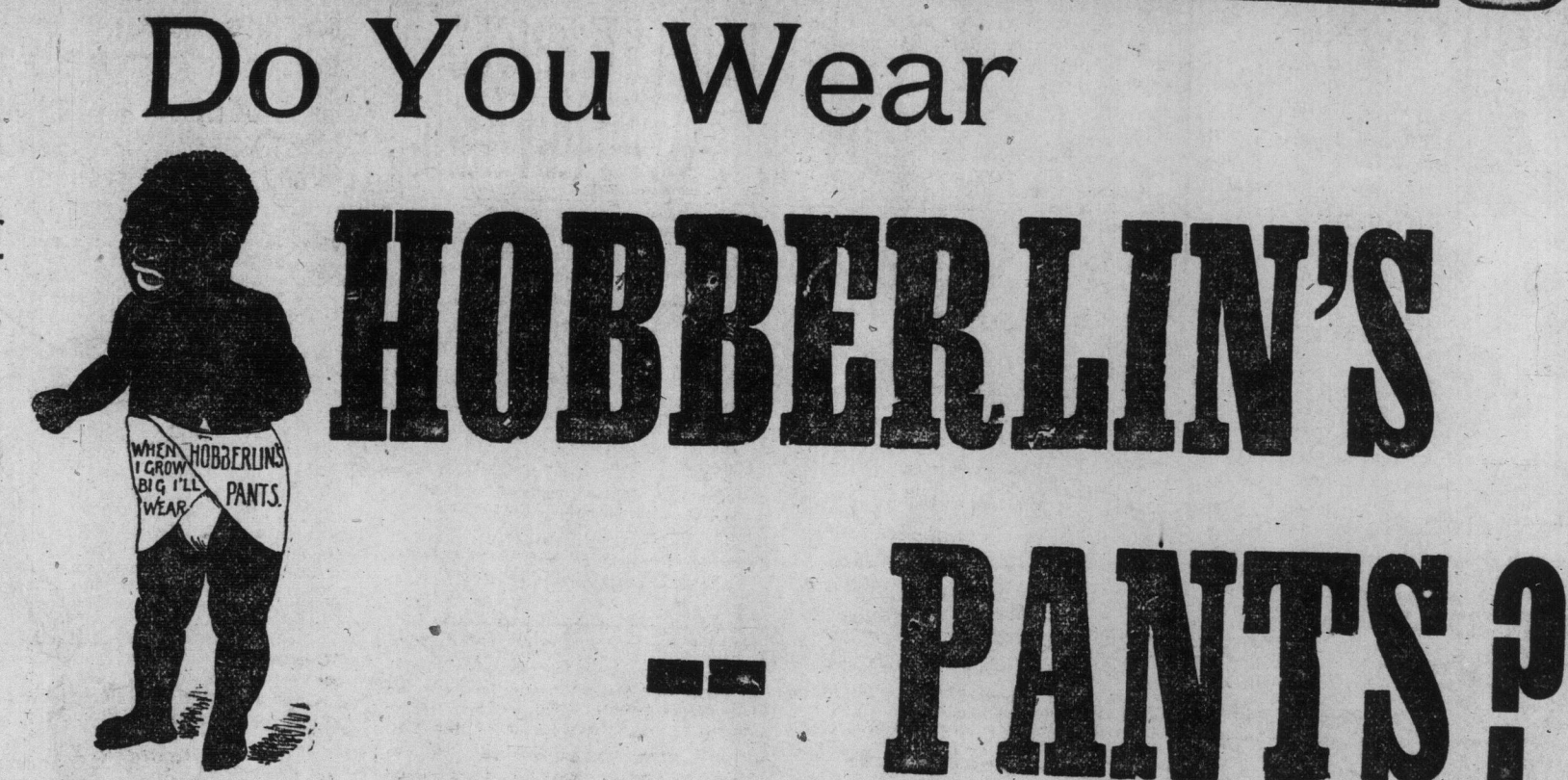

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### TEACHING STAFF REORGANIZED.

#### Appointments to Upper Canada College

Sanctioned by the Board of Trustees.

The Board of Trustees have made the necessary appointments in connection with the reorganization of the teaching staff of Upper Canada College, with effect from July 1st, 1895.

First classical master--Mr. W. S. Jackson, B.A., reappointed.

Second classical master--Mr. S. B. Leacock, B.A., reappointed.

Modern language master--Mr. A. A. Macdonald, M.A., reappointed.

Science and mathematics master--Mr. D. H. Hall, B.A., reappointed.

English master--Mr. E. R. Peacock, M.A., reappointed.

Preparatory form master--Mr. G. F. Macdonnell, M.A., reappointed.

Of these appointments all have been sanctioned by the Board of Trustees, and are in accordance with the recommendations of the Council, except in the case of the last two, viz. Mr. Peacock and Mr. Macdonnell, who have been appointed only within the last few days.

It is understood that Mr. Peacock comes to the work with very high testimonials and recommendations from Rev. Principal Grant and from Dr. J. A. McLellan, principal of the Ontario School of Pedagogy, and others, while Mr. Macdonnell, who is a son of the Rev. D. J. Macdonnell of St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, comes with equally high testimonials and recommendations from Prof. Fletcher of Queen's University and others. It is worthy of note that Mr. Macdonnell was head boy of the college in 1889.

The matter of the appointment of a master to teach drawing, etc., is yet under consideration.

The time for receiving applications for the office of principal has not yet expired.

The generosity of Mr. George W. Beardsmore and Mr. W. R. Brock has prompted them each to give annual prizes at the college. Mr. Beardsmore gives an annual prize to the value of \$150 in books, to be distributed in awards in the several forms for proficiency in Canadian history and geography. Mr. Brock gives prizes in the upper, middle and lower school respectively for proficiency in the knowledge of Bible history.

Has Debts in Two Hemispheres.

New York, July 10--Justice Van Wyck, in the City Court to-day, appointed Harry B. Jackson, receiver for Duncan E. Cameron, son of Sir Rodolph Cameron, member of the Knickerbocker Club of this city, and the receiver of the Junior Carlton Club of London. The receiver was appointed in supplementary proceedings instituted by Henry Lewis to establish the financial condition of young Cameron, against whom Lewis has a judgment for \$1800.
