EARL AND COUNTESS OF ABERDEEN AT OTTAWA.

Ottawa, Dec. 6.—The Governor-General and Countess Aberdeen, with their family and suite, returned to the Capital to-day, after an absence of more than four months. For a portion of the period they remained in retirement at Lord Aberdeen's farm in British Columbia, but during the remainder of the time and on the journey each way, a large number of places have been officially visited. Their Excellencies have everywhere been received with much hospitality and heartiness.
