Interned Austrians Revolt

Coochrane, May 15—One man dead and 9 seriously wounded and 4 injured is the result of an outbreak instigated by 300 Austrian prisoners who arrived here on Wednesday last under guard of 300 soldiers.

The outbreak, in which the 900 other inmates of the camp participated, occurred on Friday, and the riot lasted several hours, the soldiers using their bayonets as well as firing on the prisoners.

Details of the riot show that the newly-arrived Austrians refused to do manual labor. The leaders were taken aside by the military authorities and advised to yield, but while the conference was in progress the rank and file attempted to rush the wire fence, being met by the guards with fixed bayonets. Several broke through and shots were fired at them, but most of the mutineers who were injured received their wounds at the point of the bayonet.

To The Corn Growers of Lambton County

Gentlemen:—Corn planting time is now upon us and we find things very unfavorable for seeding operations. Continued wet weather has left seeding time very late and the ground tough and difficult to work. It looks as if corn planting will be carried on under very unfavorable conditions.

Good, strong germinating seed corn is most essential in a season of this kind and we can't afford to take chances on the later varieties of Dent Corn. Let us select the earlier varieties of Dent corn, such as Golden Glow, White Cap Yellow Dent, Bailey or Early Learning. Our Field Crop Competitions have shown that these varieties will mature under ordinary conditions in Lambton County, while in the case of some of the later varieties, such as Wisconsin No. 7, this point is doubtful. Let us sow Lambton grown seed corn if possible if it has been saved right. It has been demonstrated beyond doubt that corn selected from Lambton County will mature from 6 to 10 days earlier than corn grown farther south.

Let every good farmer enter the Field Crop Competitions in corn growing carried on by the Agricultural Societies and the Lambton Corn Growers' Association. The Corn Growers' Association is endeavoring to work in co-operation with the Agricultural Societies. We have asked each Agricultural Society in the county of Lambton to put on corn as one of the field crops in their competitions, and the same field which competes in the Agricultural Society will compete for the Hanna trophy. Labor is scarce, but we can't afford to neglect our corn crop and there is no greater incentive to growing a good crop of corn than to have it entered in competition with your neighbors.

The Annual corn Show held in

Petrols each January is becoming one of the greatest educational forces in the County. Let every farmer prepare now to have some corn to enter in competition at this event. An effort is being made to get the Farmers' clubs interested in the Corn Show by putting up displays. The first Farmers' Club visited passed a resolution saying they would put on a display. It is my intention, between now and next January, to visit as many Farmers' clubs as possible and try and have them co-operate with us in boosting Lambton county and the farmers' interests.

In closing, I appeal to every farmer to co-operate with the Corn Growers' Association in making corn growing and the seed corn problem in Lambton county the greatest success possible.

Warwick Women's Institute

The Warwick branch of the Women's Institute held their annual meeting in the Forester's hall on Thursday, May 11th. The meeting was opened with singing and prayer by the president. The minutes of previous meeting read and adopted.

The voluntary cash offering was responded to very generously and will be used for the relief of the Canadian prisoners of war. Great interest has been taken in the red cross and relief work during the year. The following has been shipped to the Red Cross Society: 6 quilts, 44 sheets, 34 pillow slips, 18 grey flannel shirts, 13 pair grey woolen socks, 4 pillows, 6 towels, 1 surgical robe, 10 rolls of bandages, 17 dozen handkerchiefs, 1 day shirt, safety pins, a large quantity of old cotton and linen.

The following has been sent for relief of Belgian and French: 17 colored quilts, 2 pair pants, 1 vest, 1 pair socks, 1 pair stockings, 12 ladies' coats, 6 children's bonnets, 2 skirts, 3 dresses, 2 caps, 1 fur ruff, a quantity of children's clothing.
