Those marked thus * are new Members. From the above list it will be seen, that of our thirty-two Representatives, there are fourteen new members—of these, three are upon the Act, recently sanctioned by His Majesty, for increasing the Representation in the counties of Kent, Gloucester, and Carleton—one Member each having been debarred the privilege by the Act which erected it into a separate County, of electing a Representative until a General Election took place. Although we have placed Mr. J. A. Wilmer among the new ones, he was elected a Member in the room of the late William Taylor, Esq. In the interim between the prorogation and dissolution of the late House—of course had never taken his seat.

The late Members, with two exceptions (Mr. Humber in St. John, and Mr. Vail in King's County) have been re-elected in most cases by considerable majorities—wherever they came forward as Candidates.

Of the new Members, four have sat in previous Houses, viz. Mr. Johnston, Mr. J. M. Wilmer, Mr. Palmer, and Mr. Freeze.
