The Hon. Mr. Botsford viewed the measure so long-anticipated, and now so earnestly matured, as matter called for by the voice of the country, and by the principles of the Constitution under which we live, the happiness to live. It is beyond all question in most unpopularity that the Colonial Democrats stood as such a juncture, have been in such hands, as those of Lord Glenelg; and certainly the gentlemen composing the deputation seem to have displayed no small degree of adroitness in discovering and taking advantage of his peculiar impressions. It is easy to see, through the whole of the correspondence, that Lord Glenelg is totally ignorant of the state of the Western Colonies, and every thing connected with them. Through the whole of his previous life he has been connected, more or less intimately, with the East; all his impressions have been imbibed from the East; his introduction into public life arose from the East. As long ago as 1793, he wrote a book on the East, which he entitled "Observations on the state of Society among the Asiatic subjects of Great Britain," particularly with respect to morals, and on the means of improving it—a work which, on account of a great ability, was ordered by the House of Commons to be printed in their report of 1812. When the *Delegates* opened their case of abuses and oppressions in Africa

ce demands. Let them give every opportunity to the various threatened interests, bring in their petitions, and let them have no impediment in the way of counsel heard. Let them consider that the postponing the surrender of the revenue for another year, or the holding another Legislative session during the ensuing summer are not of small importance compared with the passing of such a bill. It is their duty to fully satisfy with respect to every one of its details before they concur in passing it, and if any doubt should exist to the intention of any party to the contract, the Secretary of State, it is their duty to send one delegate, to explain their views of measure, and print out objections to it, to receive from the lips of Lord Glenelg him a positive declaration, that after a careful consideration of all that has been alleged in the Assembly in favour of the Bill, and themselves, as an independent Branch of Legislators, and also by the Lieutenant Governor against it, he is determined to adhere to its provisions without any additional alteration whatever. This is a proceeding due to themselves and to their own honour and integrity, to the constitution of the province, to the various interests at stake, and the King, whose appointment they occupy their honorable position in the country, there is no fear that they will be led away
