THE GUILTY TRIAL.

This long trial, extending over a period of seventy-three days, has at last come to an end. The Judge closed his charge on Wednesday last in the afternoon, and the jury after an absence of fifty minutes, brought in a verdict of "Guilty as indicted."

The Verdict Announced. Shortly after 5.30 Guiteau was again brought in on all sides. His step was somewhat unsteady, and he threatened his lack of difficulty; but all eyes were turned from him to the jury box, the jury being momentarily expected. Hadly Guiteau seated in the dock when a laudatory announcement of the jury. They entered solemnly. The clerk called the roll, the vast mass of spectators held their breath to hear the verdict.

The Closing Scene. With a few words of thanks from Judge Cox to the jury for their presence and duty, a decision was announced. That verdict would meet with the approval of their own consciences and the merits of the case. The jury left their seats with a sigh of relief, and were no longer prisoners. Then the Clerk declared the court adjourned, and the police, laudably and guards gathered about their prisoner to take him from the Court Room for the last time but one.

St. James' Church. A few days ago Esley Britton, son of Capt. Elias Britton, Esq., of St. Croix Cove, and a young man of high social position, was found dead in a high seafield to the barn floor, a pitch fork falling at his feet, and the end of the fork went through one of his fingers.

At a school meeting at Annapolis last week it was decided to buy the Grange property, to be used for school purposes. The property is a fine one, and well suited for the purpose.

Mr. Enoch Chute, near Bridgetown, was knocked down and killed yesterday by a falling tree. The tree fell on the road, and he was not returning at his usual hour.
