ANNAPOLIS.

GRANVILLE BANK ROBBERS NOW SUSPECTED OF MURDER.

A St. John despatch of the 24th inst says: Some weeks ago the dead body of an old woman named Margaret Neal, was found murdered on the road leading from Fairville to her home on the shore.

Photographs of the criminals were recognized by the keeper of the Catholic Mission and by Mr. Bond, who they held up outside Fairville and asked for money about the time and place of the Neal tragedy.

ROME'S ROYAL WELCOME TO BRITAIN'S SOVEREIGN.

Rome, April 27.—King Edward was standing the platform of his motor body car when the train reached the station, and descended almost before the train stopped.

The most imposing moment of the reception was shortly after King Edward was seated in the motor. The plaza below was packed with 50,000 people who welcomed His Majesty frantically.

After a short rest at the Quirinal, King Edward re-entered his carriage and escorted by the Carabinieri he visited the Queen Mother and then returned to the Palace.

The Malden Evening News of April 14th has the following account of the case: "Dr. Hugh L. Shaw, a popular young dentist of this city, passed away at his home, 17 Wilson avenue, last evening, at a brief illness, aged 28 years and 2 months.

Sir Thomas Lipton announces that Shamrock I. and Shamrock III. will soon proceed to the United States, where the trial races will be continued. The date of their departure has not yet been fixed, but it will be earlier than had been expected.

The militia department have acquired 600 acres of land about one and a half miles from Kentville. The land is nearly all level, and where grading is found to be necessary it will be done. A portion of the land is reserved which will be cleared. It is the intention of the government to use the land for a military college. Large barracks for cavalry will also be erected. It is understood that the Kentville troop of Hussars will be increased to a regiment. A large part of the land will be set aside for the purposes of drill and the militia camp will be moved from Alderhot to Kentville.
