Longmire & Son's schooners arrived from St. John last week with full cargoes of merchandise, and left again on Saturday and Monday for St. John.

The last of a series of entertainments given by the ladies of the Baptist Church will be given next Monday evening. The entertainments have been a success, both financially and socially.

An ice-cream and cake social will be held in the vestry of the Baptist church on Monday evening, April 15th; also a sale of useful and fancy articles by the ladies of the sewing circle. Doors open at six o'clock.

John Millard, the lumber king of Queens County, is reported by an exchange as making a tour through Kings and Annapolis Counties inspecting farms with a view to purchase. Mr. Millard would do well to inspect those advertised in the columns of the Monitor this week.

Among the farms disposed of which have been advertised in the Monitor this spring are the farm at Carleton's Corner, occupied by Mr. Margeson, purchased by Jacob B. Whitman, of Annapolis, and that of A. S. Bull, Clarence, which has been sold to Harry and Frank Marshall of Round Hill.

The annual meeting of St. James' Church Music Society is called for next Friday afternoon at 4.30 in the school room, and the adjourned Easter meeting of the congregation takes place the same evening at 7.30. A large attendance is hoped for in each instance. The confirmation class this week will be on Saturday evening at 7.30, followed by choir practice at 8.30.

There is nothing slow about the Annapolis Board of Trade. At their meeting on Monday night, among the subjects up for discussion were the government engineer's report on the condition of the Granville Ferry slips, a report from G. E. Corbett, lately returned from Ottawa on the probable shipment of iron ore from Annapolis, the combination of the present passenger and freight stations, school matters, etc. We understand they are issuing an attractive booklet for Annapolis Royal, in the interest of the tourist travel, for which the town is admirably adapted, as it possesses a natural charm and attractiveness in a high degree, and these advantages are enhanced by the care and attention bestowed upon the appearance of the town in general and the hospitable instincts of its citizens.

The death of W. A. Cathers, of St. John, for twenty years the well-known traveller for J. M. Humphrey & Co., was heard last week with regret by many maritime province people. Mr. Cathers has been in failing health for about two years. He is survived by a widow, two daughters and a son.

The Yarmouth, reported to have had forty or fifty passengers on board from St. John, was refused landing privileges at Digby on Wednesday, the mails only being received there. On Thursday Digby's health officer allowed the Prince Arthur, substituted for the Yarmouth, to land her passengers. The St. John Telegraph says:
