AN OPPORTUNITY FOR LUMBERMEN.

Lumbermen wishing to increase their
holdings of timber will be given an oppor-
tunity of securing an excellent limit on
December 18th, when Mr. Peter Ryan
will offer for sale at the Board of Trade
Rooms, Toronto, Townships 111 and 117,
known as Gough and Dunlop. These
townships are situated on the north shore
of Lake Huron and comprise 36 square
miles. The purchaser will be permitted
to take off not only the pine, but all other
varieties of timber, of which there is a
considerable quantity.

CURRENT TRADE CONDITIONS. ONTARIO.

Manufacturers express absolute satis-
faction with the volume of orders for
white pine lumber, and seem confident
that current prices will continue through-
out the winter. There is more building
in progress than at the corresponding
time last year. In Toronto work is about
to be started on a large apartment house
to cost \$150,000, and several other large
buildings are projected and will be com-
menced this fall or early in the spring.
Much building is under way in Ottawa,
where contractors are finding difficulty in
securing workmen.

The remarkable strength of the pine
market is no doubt due in part to the al-
most certainty of a short log crop this
winter on account of the many difficulties
with which operators in the woods are
meeting. Manufacturers are refusing to
contract for logs at the prices which job-
bers are asking, while it is not likely that
those who put in their own camps will
operate very heavily. Many reports are
heard that the movement of lumber is be-
ing curtailed by the scarcity of cars. A
Georgian Bay manufacturer writes that
he is unable to fill orders, and that he
looks for an advance in the price of hem-
lock and some grades of pine. Hard-
woods are moving more liberally, severa
large shipments having lately been made
to the United States. Mill owners are
asking \$15 for mill run ash, mill culls
out, \$14 for basswood, and \$12 for soft
elm. Birch and maple flooring are in
good demand. Shingles are particularly
active, and there is a moderate enquiry
for lath.

QUEBEC AND NEW BRUNSWICK.

There appears to be a further improve-
ment in spruce. The number of enquiries
received by mill men shows that there
is a strong disposition on the part of ship-
pers to conclude arrangements for next
year's supply, and it is believed that
prices will show a substantial advance
over those of the current year. The
United States is buying largely of clap-
boards, dimensions, and shingles. The
supply of clapboards is light. Sales have
been made at \$31 to \$32 for extra spruce,
and \$29 to \$30 for clears, Boston delivery.
Some of the largest shippers of cedar
shingles are sold out. The price of ex-
tras on Boston freight rate is \$5.10 to
\$3.20; clears, \$2.75 to \$2.85. Higher
prices are asked for lath, 1 1/4 inch bringing
\$3.10 and and 1 1/2 inch \$2.90. No tran-
