First of all, we can amend our Canadian Constitution, substantially, in the areas which are under Federal responsibility. We cannot affect the distribution of powers, obviously. But in the areas coming under strictly the Federal authority, we can make a lot of changes; and we are working on this at the present time.

So that is one area where we can make changes.

The other area -- which is the whole question of the working of Federal Provincial Relations and the distribution of powers between the two levels of Government -- is one, obviously, that needs a lot of consultation with the Provinces -- and a consensus with the Provinces.

The current Quebec Government has said that they are not interested in discussing a new Constitution except in the context of independence, or "Sovereignty Association".

Well, there is no way we will buy that! Nor will we negotiate that! So, as long as the current Government is in Office in Quebec; and as long as it has not lost its forthcoming referendum, there is very little hope for a strictly new Constitution and a real serious discussion about the distribution of powers.

I don't think it will take place. There need to be at least two to discuss. So you have to vote for a [for] defeat of the referendum, and/a new Government, which will be a "Federalist" Government, in Quebec. And I hope that this
