Mr. Horner (Acadia): Thank you, Mr. Speaker, I can only assume those hon. gentlemen did not like what I was saying and attempted to drown out my remarks.

It is evident from the manner in which they rejected the subamendment that they do not want this proposed legislation subjected to close scrutiny by the standing committee on agriculture and colonization, in spite of the fact that, to use the minister's words, it is experimental legislation. That fact does not speak well for this legislation.

BUSINESS OF THE HOUSE

Mr. Churchill: Mr. Speaker, may I ask the house leader to outline the business for the rest of this week?

Mr. Favreau: Mr. Speaker, we will carry on tomorrow with the business as announced, in an attempt to obtain second reading of this

farm machinery bill. It will then go to the committee stage, following which we will deal with legislation relating to the Crop Insurance Act. On completion of that we will deal with a bill relating to amendments to certain acts administered by the department of insurance. On Wednesday, in order to give members of this house an opportunity to express their views in respect of amendments to the constitution of Canada being made in Canada, I intend to have the estimates of the Department of Justice placed before the house, but only for that purpose. We will use whatever time available on Wednesday for that purpose. The estimates to follow are those of the Department of Trade and Commerce and the Postmaster General, who is responsible as the minister in charge, for the Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation regulations. A consideration of those estimates will be followed by a consideration of the balance of the estimates of the Department of Citizenship and Immigration and the estimates of other departments to be announced tomorrow.
