Mr. Haidasz: In thanking the Minister of Veterans Affairs for announcing to us the good news of special compensation for former prisoners of war, including European prisoners of war, I should like to ask the minister whether he will take into consideration compensation for former prisoners of war who are Canadian citizens, and who during the time of war fought under Canadian command but were not Canadian citizens then.

Mr. MacDonald (Cardigan): Veterans from other countries who fought with the allies are generally looked after by the country from which they came.

REQUEST FOR FUNDS BY SOCIETY FOR THE STUDY OF THE HERITAGE OF CANADA

Question No. 3,602-Mr. Brisco:

- 1. Did the Department of Indian Affairs fund the Society for the Study of the Heritage of Canada for the Heritage Stoney Wilderness School and, if so, on what date?
- 2. Did the Department actually fund this project and, if so (a) on what date (b) in what amount?

Mrs. Iona Campagnolo (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development): 1. In early 1974, the Stoney Wilderness Centre requested that the Department contribute to a maximum of \$75,000 for an advertising program.

2. On May 8, 1974 the Department disbursed \$48,000 against invoices for advertising and promotion from the Society for the Study of the Heritage of Canada. On June 4, 1974 another \$27,000 was disbursed against properly receipted invoices.

Hon. Mitchell Sharp (President of the Privy Council): The "General Records Disposal Schedules of the Government of Canada"—Amendment No. 3 requires that we keep records only for six years; therefore information is not available prior to April 1, 1969.
