The contention has all been around the fact that the O.F.A. refuses to take up such an important matter with only a scattering of the representatives present and then give out a ruling which might not only totally disagree with the ma-jority of the unrepresented members' views, but also leave an opening for a split in the ranks of the association. Viewed from a logical and unbiased standpoint it looks like one of the wisest moves that they have made in some time. Any other body that wishes to make application for affiliation must do so at annual or semi-annual meeting, and why should the pros. be treated differently and given special hearings? Did the pros. think for one moment when they were casting themselves out of the fold that they would be asking for such an agreement at such an early date? Cer-tainly not. They did all they could to hold the amateur game up to ridicule; they tried to show up the officers of the or-ganization and used everything in their power to hand the amateur game a black eye. These are the men who are now seeking affiliation; not that they may benefit the association, but that they may eke out a weekly renumera-tion for their services, and with the aid of the men who have organized the game and kept it on its feet, get back into the public's favor and in name, any-way the world of sport. The T. & D, were a little peeved at first that the O.F.A. had taken the mat-ter of settling the cases of the local pro-fessionals out of their hands. Perhaps it was the fact that they would have liked to have got back at their recent persectors. It was a case of the biter bitten, but after hearing all the facts the T. & D. decided to let the O.F.A. hand oout the mediche, while they sat and looked oi.
