PROS. WANT EARLY HEARING BY O.F.A.

Rumored That D.F.A. Will
Take Hand in Affair—Com-
mittee Takes Firm Stand.

The following professional football players have applied to the O.F.A. for reinstatement and their applications will be taken up at the semi-annual meeting, which will be held the first Saturday after Good Friday: Queen City, J. McCracken, W. Worrell, Mike Curran, Thomas Dalzell, David McMurey, Thomas Ogle, W. Dady, Thomas Phair, James Twiddle; Toronto, W. Moffatt; Ottawa, L. C. Robertson, Douglas Lang, A. G. Hutchings, Ernest Palmer, T. Vi-gette. None of these men played on the recent trip of the local pros. to St. Louis.

The recent newspaper controversy stirred up regarding the decision of the emergency committee of the O.F.A., which decided not to take up the application of the professional teams in Hamilton and Toronto for affiliation until the annual meeting, has brought the following reply from them which is signed by three of their members: The emergency committee of the O.F.A. is prepared to stand by any decision of theirs regarding the league, and no member of the committee can be blamed in any way for what has happened. The secretary has been only acting according to instructions of the committee. We do not wish any further conversation with the press.

The contention has all been around the fact that the O.F.A. refused to take up such an important matter with only a scattering of the representatives present and then give out rules which might not only totally disagree with the majority of the unrepresented members, but also have an opening for a split in the ranks of the association. Viewed from a logical and unbiased standpoint it looks like one of the wisest moves that they have made in some time. Any other body that wishes to make application for affiliation must do so at annual or semi-annual meeting, and why should they be treated differently and given special hearings? Did the pros. think for one moment when they were casting their votes out of the field that they would be asking for such an agreement at such an early date? Certainly not. They did it only to hold the amateur game up to ridicule; they tried to show up the officers of the organization and used everything in their power to hand the amateur game a black eye. They are the men who are now seeking affiliation; not that they may benefit the association, but that they may get out a weekly remuneration for their services, and with the aid of the men who have organized the game and kept it on its feet, get back into the public's favor and in name, anyway, the world of sport.

The O.F.A. has little peevish at first that the O.F.A. had taken the matter of settling the cases of the local professionals out of their hands. Perhaps it was the fact that they would have been asked to go back at their respective purses. It was a case of the bitter bitten, but after hearing all the facts the T. & D. decided to let the O.F.A. hand out the medicine, while they sat and looked on. However, now the case has taken another aspect. The pros. by their influence, have prevailed upon President Watson to go over the heads of the O.F.A. and have an earlier settlement of the case. Just whether Mr. Watson intends to do this or not is not known, but it would hardly be coming to his office for him to take such a step. He is a man of honor and he is going to take a mail vote and decide the question. If the parent body is going to have this kind of thing and practically say "You are too slow, we will settle it what is going to happen? It will not take long to have a civil war going on in football circles, who have already enough battles with the A.A.U. of C. to settle without having domestic troubles to fix up. However, it is a question whether the D.F.A. has the right to step into this and solve it. Under the constitution of the D.F.A. each province was to handle its own affairs, with the parent body only taking action in national things. This is purely a provincial affair.

The question has been asked "Will the professionals put up the fees necessary for the consideration of their application?" They have not done so as yet in putting their application before the Ontario body. Before the D.F.A. begins to meddle in other people's affairs they had better get down to brass tacks. Lastly, what right have these men to ask for affiliation with a body which they so openly defied no less than a month ago. Secretary Robertson of the D.F.A. sent them a letter warning them that the teams that they were going to play in St. Louis and other places on their trip were outlaw teams not connected with the United States Association. Did they listen to the secretary's warning? Certainly not. They just ignored it and went and played these teams. If they will ignore the officials of this body before they are affiliated, what will they do afterwards?

The annual meeting of the T. & D. will be held on Monday, Feb. 2, and it should prove to be one of the liveliest meetings of the season for some time. All teams signing up new players that have just come over from the old country, for next season, will have these players, if they have been professionals in the old country, must secure their reinstatement there before they are eligible to play in the D.F.A. This new rule is the result of the affiliation with the International Football Federation.
