" be fully satisfied for all the Provisions and other Necessaries, which they should supply the Troops with during their being

" quarter'd among them."

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These Declarations arrived very seasonably at Annapolis; Mr. Mascarene found means to disperse them among the Deputies and Inhabitants before the Day, by which they were required to give Mr. De Ramsay their Answer, and they had the Effect to make them unanimous in declaring to the French Commander their Resolution to trust to the Assurances given them by the Governor of the Massachusets Bay, of being protected in the Enjoyment of their Estates by the King of Great Britain, and absolutely refusing to take up Arms and join with the Canadians: And they immediately fignified the same to Mr. Mascarene, with their several Addresses to Mr. Shirley, thanking him for the Protection he had promifed them, and declaring their Resolutions to be loyal Subjects to the King.

In the latter End of November and Begining of December, the Troops destined for Minas embark'd at Boston for Annapolis Royal; one of the Transports with the greatest Part of the Soldiers on board was lost in its Passage upon the Rocks near Monts Deserts, the Remainder arrived safe; and in a few Days, being strengthened with a Party from the Garrison, embark'd for Minas, and entered Grand Pré, the chief Town in that District,

about the latter End of December.
