CAP. XXXV.

An Act to Incorporate a Temperance Hall Company in Halifax.

(Passed the 11th day of April, 1848.)

WHEREAS the erection of a Temperance Hall in Halifax will be of great public advantage, inasmuch as it will afford accommodation for holding Public Meetings convened for moral and useful purposes: And Whereas, the several persons hereinafter named, and others, have entered into a subscription to raise in Shares such sum as may be requisite as a Joint Stock or Fund for that purpose:

I. Be it therefore enacted, by the Lieutenant-Governor Council, and Assembly, That Robert Noble, William M. Brown, John W. Barss, Charles B. Naylor, Samuel Carten, William C. Silver, Eddy Tupper, Edward Jost, Joseph Bell, Samuel Story the third, William H. Marvin, Archibald Patterson, John Whitman, William J. Coleman, and Charles Robson, and all and every such person or persons as shall from time to time become Proprietors of Shares in the Company and Undertaking herehy established, and their respective Successors, Executors, and Administrators and Assigns, shall be, and they are hereby declared to be a Body, Politic and Corporate, by the name of "The Halifax Temperance Hall Company," and by that name shall have perpetual succession and a Common Seal, and by that name shall and may sue and be sued, plead or be impleaded, in all Courts of Law and Equity within this Province.

II. And be it enacted, That the said Company shall and may take, purchase, and hold any Lands, Houses, Tenements, and Hereditaments, in fee simple or otherwise, and also Rents, Monies, Securities for Monies, Goods and Chattels, and shall and may demise and let, sell, and convey, or mortgage the same, or any part thereof, subject to the restrictions hereinafter mentioned, and do and execute all other things in and about the same, which may be necessary and proper for the benefit of the said Company; and shall have
