

L. E. Seagram Imports Four More Royally Bred Racehorses

Note and Comment

Edmund Haines is to be congratulated for the splendid selection of thoroughbreds he made on short notice for Mr. Seagram. The four racers, that arrived in Toronto yesterday, are of the best English lineage, and may be counted upon to earn brackets among the high classed horses racing hereabouts this fall. The ocean voyage would make it appear impossible to race at Woodbine this week, but the horsemen who looked the quarter over yesterday say one at least of the four is likely to sport silk at the forthcoming O. J. C. meeting.

The victory of Cruche d'Or in the Gold Cup race at Montreal is a reminder that the mare was one that Mr. Haines also brought out for Mr. Seagram three years ago.

The word from Montreal is to the effect that there will be a plethora of entries for the Canadian track and field championships on Saturday. The only regret is that Toronto will likely be represented due to a selfish understanding said to exist among the local brigade, and there is no one to blame but themselves.

Because of the late ending of the National League season, the Athletics and Cubs will begin in Chicago. It is believed, three games being played there before the teams depart for St. Paul, Philadelphia. Under this arrangement, it is expected the Cubs will open with a pronounced advantage because of great partisan crowds, but the Athletics can play a formidable game away from home, and are not fearful of the result. President Robinson of the St. Louis Cardinals still refuses to bring forward his game to the 13th and 14th, but he is under strong pressure, and may capitulate.

Billy Zimmerman, right fielder of the U.S. Club of the New York State League, made what is believed to be a world's record for stolen bases during the season just closed. The flight was brought to a close the other day, and Zimmerman stole a total of 36 bases in 138 games.

Next season, having been drafted by that organization, Zimmerman played the latter part of last season with the Eastern League at that time, and let him go to Utica this spring.

Should Newark and Rochester keep up their record of yesterday, the pennant would still go to the Husters, who do worse than lose one day to hand the rag to McGinley.

Rochester claims two records broken by the Husters this season. Winning a second pennant, and after the 139th game, makes a new record for the league. The box office record likewise establishes a new record, not only for the season, but for the league, according to the claim. The total Rochester attendance was 231,270, with an average of 1,652 per game of 142. Last year's total attendance, which was also a record, was 241,881, with an average of 1,731 per game.

Baltimore expects to keep in third place, having to finish up with the last two clubs in the league. The remaining three days of the week will be played with Providence, the last day of the race winding up with a double-header. Toronto has two games to-day, next six in three days with Buffalo at the stadium, and then they play the races.

According to St. Louis scribes Frank Farrell is angling for Bobby Wallace, the brilliant third baseman of the Browns. Farrell intimates that all he needs for a winning combination next year is a hard-hitting third baseman, and he thinks that Wallace would fill the bill nicely. Farrell is said to have the owner, Hedges, to name his figure, and if cash is not required he would be willing to enter into a trade for Wallace.
