The four racers, that arrived in Toronto yesterday, are of the best English lineage, and may be counted upon to earn brackets among the high classed thoroughbred racehorses of this fall. The ocean voyage would make it appear impossible to race at Woodbine this week, but the horsemen who looked the quartet over yesterday say one at least of the four is likely to sport silk at the forthcoming O. J. C. meeting.
