A decided novelty in Toronto was the performance of Camille St. Saens' plan quartet in B flat major on Saturday afternoon at the public rehearsal of the Hambourg Concert Society concert which will be given this evening in the Canadian Foresters' Hall. The public rehearsals are decidedly popular and the hell was comfortably filled to hear the attractive program provided. Miss Grace Smith took the plano part in the quartet with the clever brilliance and intelligent power for which she has taught her audiences to look. The string parts were taken by Jan Hambourg. An encore for the Paganini number was acknowledged by the performance of an "Orientaie" by Cui.




