INCREASED WAGES
FOR TELEGRAPHERS

Board of Conciliation Recommends Adjustment Between C.P.R. and Operators.

NEW RULES ADVISED
Toronto Salaries Should Be Brought Up to Level With Those in Montreal.

Ottawa, Aug. 23.—The board of conciliation under the Industrial Disputes Act which has inquired into the dispute between the Canadian Pacific and its commercial telegraph operators in a report issued today, recommends an increase in wages. The report says:

"In the matter of wages the company have acceded to an increase based upon the application of the findings of the McCord Commission and the undersigned are of the opinion that this affords a fair adjustment of wages and should be adopted. Their proposal shows some disparity between Toronto and Montreal, which should be adjusted by bringing Toronto wages to a level with Montreal.

"The Montreal operators should be paid \$70 on entering the service; after six months' satisfactory service; \$80 after one year's service. "Change in wages should be made effective as of first of August, 1918."

The report recommends the adoption of a number of new rules relating to the payment of wages to commercial telegraphers, including the following: "Telegraphers shall be granted leave of absence each year with pay at regular wages as follows: One week after the first and second year and two weeks after three years' service.

Where regular relieving agents are appointed, they will not be included in the telegraphers' ratings while engaged in such duties, but will retain all seniority rights and will receive one dollar per day extra expenses while away from headquarters. "On and after September 1, 1918, where telegraphers are required to use typewriters the same shall be supplied and maintained by the company. "No telegrapher shall be compelled to work more than five consecutive hours without a lunch relief.

In case of reduction of staff, the senior telegraphers from the district will be dispensed with, and if reduction is necessary in higher grades, the junior in higher grade will have the preference of continuing in the service, but at a reduced salary and so on thru each class until the junior class is reached.

The foregoing recommendations are made by Judge J. R. Scott of Perth, chairman, and W. N. Tuley, K.C., Toronto who represented the company in a majority report.

Mr. D. Campbell Toronto, the representative of the men in a minority report, recommends a high scale of wages and that they should become effective as from May 1 instead of Aug. 1, 1918.

AWARDED FLYING CROSS.

Knowlton, Que., Aug. 23.—Senator G. G. Foster has today received a cable message announcing that his son, Lieut. George Buchanan Foster, of the Royal Air Force, has been awarded the new decoration of the Distinguished Flying Cross, the highest honor to be awarded any officer of the air service, for gallant conduct in action, and ranking next to the Victoria Cross.

AIRMEN ARE TRAINED TO NOTE CAMOUFLAGE

Have to Combine the Wits of Detective With the Eye of an Eagle.

Behind the British Lines in France, Aug. 23.—Every British and American aviator nowadays undergoes a special course of training in "counter-camouflage." He is told all the tricks of the German camouflage art; to deceive the enemy's aviators, and his eye is carefully trained to penetrate the art of the enemy. It is diamond cut diamond as the time in the contest between the German camouflage expert and the allied observers. Troops may be moved on roads camouflaged by canvas, but there is camouflage also even in the business of moving troops in the open, where the German practices a simple little deception by varying the spacing between one rank and the next, so that in a long column the observer's estimate of the numbers on the move is hopelessly inaccurate.

AMERICA MUST KEEP HER FOOD PLEDGE

Will Have to Supply Enormous Amount to Allies, Says Hoover.

New York, Aug. 23.—The United States will share with the allies their scarce food as well as blood in the cause of world democracy, declared Herbert C. Hoover, federal food administrator, on his arrival here today, en route to Washington after a brief visit to England and France. Asserting that "we have to make good" a pledge to this effect, which he had given to the allied food administrators, Mr. Hoover said that, to do so, America will next year have to supply the allies 4 billion pounds of fats, 900,000,000 pounds of beef products, 500,000,000 bushels of cereals and 1,500,000 tons of sugar. However, Mr. Hoover added, beginning Sept. 1 there will be no need for drastic food rationing in the allied countries except in the case of sugar and beef.

COL. GINGRAS, D.S.O., FACES COURT-MARTIAL

Was Released Some Time Ago From Duties With Second Depot Battalion.

Montreal, Aug. 23.—Instructions have been received today by Lieut.-Col. M. A. Piche, acting G.O.C. here, from military headquarters at Ottawa, that a general court-martial has been ordered to enquire into certain charges against Lieut.-Col. Daly Gingras, D.S.O., officer commanding the 2nd Depot Battalion, 2nd Quebec Regiment.

No details are given, but it is understood that the court-martial will deal with certain matters in connection with the financial arrangements for the battalion of which he was the commanding officer.

Some time ago, Lieut.-Col. Gingras was released from his duties with the 2nd Depot Battalion on indefinite leave, and now matters have come to a head with the order for a general court-martial. It is expected that the court will sit at military headquarters here in Bishop street, during next week. FRENCH AVIATORS SHARE IN BATTLE

Drop Explosives, Bomb Germans, Photograph Enemy Positions.

Paris, Aug. 23.—A French official communication on aviation says: "On the 22nd our observers carried out numerous reconnoitering excursions very deeply into the enemy line, particularly photographic missions, which brought back more than a thousand photographs.

"Our chasing squadrons have brought down or put out of action 14 enemy machines and set on fire nine captive balloons. "During the night 25 tons of bombs were dropped on the stations of Ham, Laon, and Guise. We blew up the ammunition depot of Sommes Fautcourt. The railway stations of Mezieres, Maison Blue, Mauchaux and Fontaverly also were bombed.

RUSHING TO JOIN.

Montreal, Aug. 23.—Tomorrow is the last day of grace for men who have opted to enlist under the Military Service Act, and a feature of the situation here was the rush of men to join the colors, both at the 1st Depot Battalion, at the Guy street barracks, and at the 2nd Depot Battalion, at the Peel street barracks. Today it was stated that well over a thousand defectors had taken advantage of the amnesty during Thursday and Friday, and the number of men reporting shows no signs of letting up.

It is expected that the rush will be intensified tomorrow.
