THE STEAM ROADS OBJECT TO PAY THE COST OF KEEPING UP THEIR CROSSINGS

Of the Toronto Railway Company's Plans
—An Appeal to Ottawa—No Legislation Can Be Predicted This Session, Says a Well-Known Politician—Public Cable C.P.R. Sunday Train

Ottawa, Feb. 9.—The Railway Committee of the Privy Council, after a lengthy session yesterday, the minutes present being Hon. Mr. Haggart (chairman), Sir A. P. Caron, Hon. Mr. D'Alton, and Hon. Mr. Parson. Several cases of interest to Ontario people were up for consideration.

Mr. William Latimer, M.P., of Toronto, was present to oppose an appeal from the committee of the C.P.R. and G.T.R. to secure a revision of the order made by the committee some months ago, directing that the two railway companies should pay the cost of working certain semaphore signals, gates, derails or steam blocks, at the crossings of the Toronto Street Railway over these roads. The two railway companies contend that they are paying more than their due share of the protection, owing to the omission of a clause in the formal order made by the committee. They say that it is only fair to require them to pay no more than what they were accustomed to before the order was issued. The Street Railway Company is trying to shirk a portion of the judgment, and is now suing for the reopening of the case, but he was ruled out on the point. The committee decided to refer to the official report of the proceedings of the committee when the matter came up originally for argument and decision, and if any omission has been made from the order given, then this will be rectified.

Major Carpenter was present, representing a number of fishermen and residents of Burlington Beach who complained that the Grand Trunk Railway has deprived them of access to their fishing grounds, by building a wire fence on each side of the beach, and closing up certain gates and crossings.

After some discussion it was decided that Mr. Bell, solicitor for the G.T.R., and Major Carpenter should confer together with a view to settling the arrangements by which the objections of the fishermen may be overcome.

In the matter of the proposed crossing of the G.T.R. in the Township of York, the case stood over, as no one was present representing the township. Mr. Bell promised, however, that Chief Engineer Hobson would refer to the matter with a view to remedying the complaints.

Other cases preferred by Mr. E. Dube of Fraserville, of discrimination against him by the Temiscouata Railway, were also brought up, appearing for Mr. Dube. The complainant is a lumber merchant and claims that the railway company's officials unjustly discriminated against him in the charges for carrying railway ties.

No legislation looked for this session. A well-known politician said tonight that he does not believe in any legislation for the session of Parliament. It is believed, however, that the Government will not pass any bills of importance during the session. The Government is expected to pass the Finance Bill, the Education Bill, and the Bill for the amendment of the Criminal Code.

THIS IS RUSSIAN VENGEANCE.
Indicted Upon English and American Sailors at Vladivostok.

San Francisco, Feb. 9.—Edward Howe of Petaluma, Calif.; Frank Peterson of Seattle; and Stephen Brennan of San Francisco, together with a number of American and English sailors, forming the crew of the sailing schooner Salpan, have been convicted at Vladivostok of sea robbery at Robben Island and conspiracy to rob the Government storehouses at Robben. Howe was sentenced to 18 months, Peterson to 12 months, Brennan and a man named C. L. Olson to 14 years each, and the balance of the offenders, 12 in number, to 18 years each. The British Consul at Vladivostok made a hard fight to save the men. Unless the Government requires a severe sentence, the men will be allowed to return to their homes. The Russians allege that their officers are grievously injured from facts gathered it would not seem that it was.
