Excessive weakness renders his condi-tion alarming. His Eminence is suf-fering from the ailments common to fering from the allments common to old age. His strength falls him entirely. His doctors term his malady "decrepitude." In fact it has been an open secret for some time that His Eminence was suffering from both mental and physical decay. Infancy Helplessness and infirmitles have weighed upon the venerable prelate. His private physician says that the remaining days of life of the Cardinal Archbishop are numbered. At 8.30 to-night the Cardinal was a little better, but his pulse was very feeble and unsettled.
