"Our party has come to the conclusion that there is from for big improvement in the banking system of Canada. It was well known that money placed in these branches was sent to the central banks in the cities, and there invested in diverge enterprises. This in itself was sufficient to prove that the cities were being built up at the expense of the country districts, a state of things that should not exist in any country.
