PROGRESS THRU THE WEST.
Indian Head, N.W.T., Sept. 27.—Indian Head was reached at 11 o'clock. Crowds were waiting on the station platform, which was decorated with flags, bunting and sheaves of wheat. The reception to the royal party was also enthusiastic and cordial. On the first train Sir Wilfrid Laurier appeared on the platform of the second train the Duke of Cornwall and York was plainly seen and cheered to the echo.

PRAIRIE COVERED WITH SNOW.

The local troops and police paraded and formed the escort of the royal party to Government House. The Duke and Duchess got their first touch of winter to-day. They awoke to find the prairie covered with snow, and the thermometer holding close to the freezing point. The westward journey was continued late in the afternoon.

Jamieson, the successful tenderer for the proposed elevator at the Montreal harbor, says today with satisfaction for certain charges of bribery in connection with the proposed harbor elevators. Mr. Jamieson did not seem to think that these charges amounted to a great deal.
