MUCH COULD BE ELIMINATED
Polygamy, Tyranny and Wine Drinking All Find a Defence in the Bible.

NOT SUITED TO PRESENT CONDITIONS
Rev. J. T. Sunderland Believes That Holy Book Reflects Religious Ideals of Its Writers.

Rev. J. T. Sunderland, M.A., delivered an interesting discourse Sunday evening in the Unitarian Church, his subject being "The New Thought of the Bible." He took for his text 2nd Timothy, 2nd chap., 9th verse: "The word of God is not bound."

The Bible, he said, was in reality the product of the different stages of the world, written by different minds under different conditions, and inspired by God just in the same sense as other books written by great minds of the past couple of hundred years.

The Bible was the outcome of all those thousand years' history of Hebrew life; it reflected the thoughts of people in all ages, and in all countries, and it was the result of the religious and social sentiment of the time. The Bible was becoming largely accepted now that the Bible was not all equal, but some of it represented the old stage of morality in man, while other parts dealt with his higher and better side. It could not be looked at that the Bible exerted an influence for good and for evil among men. What its influence for good was great, it was used as a defence for the worst of evils. As a record of history it was responsible for keeping alive that which was good, which extended among men since the beginning of the Christian era. Polygamy, tyranny and wine-drinking, all found a defence in the Bible.

Bourgeois, who ordered M. Coutant to descend, but the latter again refused, and M. Combes withdrew, and four guards were summoned to conduct M. Coutant from the building. President Bourgeois declared a recess.

After a recess of 15 minutes the session was resumed, and the President of the chamber called on Syveton and Coutant to apologize for their conduct. Coutant made the first response, declaring that he withdrew not a word of what he had said, and the disorder again broke out, but was quickly quelled. President Bourgeois then asked the chamber to act, and order of censure was adopted, with temporary expulsion, and the members of the left, and a portion of the centre party, voting for the order. As Coutant refused to apologize, M. De Taisseyre, commandant of the military at the Palais Bourbon, with a platoon of colonial infantry, was summoned. The soldiers marched into the chamber and Coutant was escorted out, amid the cries of "Down with the government supporters and the cheers of his friends."

Wants to Fight.
Deputy Syveton also declined to make a retraction, declaring that Minister Valle was the aggressor and stating that he would defend himself to the hilt. Minister Bourgeois thereupon referred the deputy's case to the chamber, which voted censure, with temporary expulsion, and the President requested M. Syveton to withdraw. This the latter refused to do, and M. Bourgeois once more suspended the session temporarily while the military police quelled the riot, and escorted Syveton out.

Order was then fairly re-established, and the Minister of Justice mounted the tribune to finish his interrupted speech, in which he defended the government's course in the Humbert case, declaring that everything possible for the government to do in the matter had been done.

A VERITABLE PRIZE FIGHT.
Paris, Dec. 7.—The violent scenes in Chamber of Deputies yesterday, which marked the close of the session, were followed to-day by a lively discussion of the incidents in parliamentary and official circles. A portion of the press treated the affair humorously, as indicative of the excitability of the parties concerned. The most serious journals, however, commented in a respectful tone on the incident. The account published by The Main presented a very graphic and amusing picture of the scene. The Journal officiel recorded an exchange of blows between the members of the chamber.
