London, March 8 .- The Earl of Aberdeen was present at a meeting yesterday, which passed a resolution exassumed by the Dominion of Canada regarding the Pacific cable.

KAISER AND KIPLING. Berlin, March 8.-Emperor William's message of sympathy to Mrs. Rudyard Kipling is commented upon by the press. The Vossische Zeitung says: This new manifestation of the emperor's friendship and the recent ones

by German's ministers, form a pleasant contrast to the erroneous statements that Germany is about to declare a tariff war on the United States. The German nation, on the contrary, is strongly desirous of living in peace with America, economically as well, but hopes for full reciprocity, and that the legitimate interests of Germany will be considered."

FRENCH FROTH.

Paris, March 8.-The Journal, in an article dealing with the question of common action on the part of France, Russia and Germany, declares that it has no wish to exaggerate the importance of such action, but confines itself to pointing out, first, that by the Anglo-German treaty, the terms of which are still secret, Germany remains unpledged to any course regarding Egypt; and, second, that despite the differences between France London, March 8. - Right Hon. Delcasse, the French foreign minister, and Mr. William St. John Broderick, parliamentary secretary of the British foreign office, has started a lively press discussion on both sides of the channel. Mr. Broderick read his statement in the House of Commons from manuscript, which, it is understood, dictated by Lord Salisbury. The Times, discussing the matter editorially, refers to the story of M. Delcasse as "transparently misleading," and in common with other papers, invites the government to publish the official documents bearing on the case, so as to set

the question at rest. WANTS AN APOLOGY. Rome, March 8.-The Italian Government is fully determined to obtain an apology from China for the Tsung-Li-Yamen's refusal of the demand of Signor Martino, Italian minister at Pe'tin, of a concession at San-Mun Bay, Province of Che-Kiang, to be used as a naval base and coaling station. A squadron of five cruisers, with 100 guns and 1,500 men, will soon arrive at

San-Mun Bay.

CABLE NOTES. The Calcutta correspondent of the Times says: "News has just been received here that Cabul, under date of Feb. 25, which says the Ameer of Afghanistan was then in excellent health, and had just held a public durbar." The Madrid Reforma says that the minister of war, Gen. Polavieja, is urging upon the cabinet the necessity of increasing the active army and the reserve, in order to be prepared for eventualities.

Intense Excitement in Holguin-\$3,000,-000 for Cubans-Naval Movements.

Manila, March 8-3:55 p.m.-The temperature today at 3 o'clock was 87°, but the cloudy air was like steam, and the troops were greatly inconvenienced in the line, in spite of the temporary shade afforded by matting and bamboos wherever feasible. There were fewer prostrations, however, from the heat

The troops today are not compelled to remain in the country to the same extent as yesterday, when they were engaged in clearing the jungle. The rebels seldom appear in the open, except in the cool of the morning, and In the evening. Our soldiers will probably feel the heat less when they are on the move.

The French se Jean Bart has arrived here. Santiago de Cuba, March 8.-Colonel Hood cables from Holguin that intense excitement prevails there, owing to the cessation of public works, and that a mass meeting has been held, at which the action of the United States military authorities at Havana was condemned as "false economy," and as "the result of centralization." Owing to the pressing necessities of the case, Col. Hood says he has issued indigent rations to three thousand heads of families, suddenly thrown out of employment. He fears there will be a

large increase in the criminal classes of his district. Practically the same news from all the other districts of Santiago province has reached here. Meanwhile money enough is lying idle in banks to pay all that is due, and to keep the men at work. Col. Hood has requested the use of the former Spanish gunboat Baracoa, recently raised by the

Americans, as a lighthouse tender. Kingston, Jamaica, March 8.-The United States gunboats Annapolis and Vicksburg have arrived here in advance of the other ships of the American squadron, and big preparations are being made by the civil and naval authorities for suitably entertaining Rear Admiral Sampson and his officers during their visit to this port.
