

Any False Step in Regard to India Wil Cause Situation Worse Than That of South Africa.

London, July 20 .- In introducing the Indian budget in the House of Commons this afternoon, Indian Secretary Morley sounded a warning note on the necessity of excluding India from the field of party politics. The most engrossing of Great Britain's foreign relations, he declared were the Asiatic, those involv ing this country with China, Japan and Russia, which was a great Asiatic as well as a European power. Any false step in India would land Great Britain in a confusion infinitely more direct and more disastrous than had the false step taken in South Africa
