## Refuses Million-Dollar Legacy; Says Christ Would Do Same

**BUZZARDS BAY, Mass., Nov. 29.**—Charles Garland, the young man who has renounced his right to a \$1,000,000 legacy left him by his father, James A. Garland, a wealthy clubman and yachtsman of Boston, today made a formal statement of his reasons for rejecting the money.

"I refuse to accept the money, because it is not mine," was young Garland's summary of his action. "I have had to choose between the loss of private property and the law, which is written in every human heart."

Garland, who has stated that he renounced his claim to the \$1,000,000, because he thought Christ would have done the same, continued:

"I believed I could do no good with the money. It is the man who gives food to the hungry who does good, not the dollars given in exchange for the food. I would be happy to be the man, if I had the food to give; but I cannot lend myself to handling the money that is not mine, even though the good that might be done is possibly great."

Mr. Garland's statement was made from his home here. The young man, who is 22 years of age, is living at the house with his wife and infant daughter

as the guest of his mother, Mrs. Mary Tudor Green, who supplies them with a maid and keeps their larger full. He plans to go to work eventually, he said, but a year at Harvard College, which he left to get married, and preparatory schooling in the United States and in England fitted him for no work ready at hand, and he said he thought it would be spring before he found anything. Mrs. Garland joined with him in his renunciation of the \$1,000,000, because he thought Christ would have done the same, continued:

"I believed I could do no good with the money. It is the man who gives food to the hungry who does good, not the dollars given in exchange for the food. I would be happy to be the man, if I had the food to give; but I cannot lend myself to handling the money that is not mine, even though the good that might be done is possibly great."

## RAIL OFFICIALS FACTORIES OPEN; WELCOME RELIEF BLACK AND TANS ARE NOT NEEDED FROM ECZEMA ARE AMBUSHED; FIFTEEN KILLED

Former C. P. R. Engineer Says Ontario Could Not Support Them.

#### ESTIMATES WRONG

Contented That Revenues Expected Could Not Be Paid by Lines.

**TORONTO, Nov. 29.**—Engineer Wm. E. Tyce, former chief engineer of the Canadian Pacific Railway, now a consulting engineer in Montreal, testifying here today before the commission investigating the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission's hydro radial projects, expressed the opinion that the province is already well supplied with the proposed 325 miles of radial railways planned by the Hydro-Electric Power Commission.

Mr. Tyce asserted that there was absolutely no necessity for the proposed systems of radials, the estimated cost of construction of which, he said, was abnormally high and the estimated operating costs abnormally low. The country is already well supplied with railways, Engineer Tyce said, but there might be necessity for "occasional new branches" here and there.

The hydro commission's estimated revenue from the radials was altogether too high, according to Mr. Tyce, and could not be paid out of the earnings.

Advices From Many Points in United States Look Brighter.

#### OUTLOOK IS BETTER

In Most Instances Wages Are Lower and Working Time Is Shorter.

**NEW YORK, Nov. 29.**—(Canadian Press.)—Advices from various parts of the United States, widely scattered, of the reopening of factories closed during the recent industrial readjustment, are taken in New York business circles as indicating the beginning of a gradual improvement in business conditions. The most instances of the opening of plants is attended with announcements of lower wage schedules or curtailed working time.

An explanation of the present state of affairs is presented today by the Fourth Federal Reserve Bank of Cleveland, Ohio, in its monthly review of conditions. The review states that business is suffering from a strike on the part of the public, which will not be drawn into the strike to purchase except for absolute necessities until it is convinced that prices are as low as may reasonably be expected and bear some evidence of stability.

A general cutting of retail meat prices, ranging from 3 cents to 11 cents a pound, brings prices nearer normal than at any time in months, the review states. Prices that have been coming down gradually for two weeks reached a new low today, ranging from 46 cents to 53 cents a pound.

## BRIT. COLUMBIA WINDS UP HOT CAMPAIGN TODAY

Liberals Confident of Tomorrow's Vote in Pacific Province.

**VANCOUVER, Nov. 29.**—(Canadian Press.)—Final meetings in one of the most strenuous provincial elections in the history of British Columbia are being held tonight and tomorrow in the city of Victoria. Polling takes place Wednesday, December 1, voting taking place between the hours of 8 a.m. and 6 p.m.

Both Premier Oliver and W. J. Bowser, Opposition leader, are speaking at two meetings, and tomorrow night the Government leader addresses a final rally in Victoria, where he is one of the Liberal candidates. He also is a candidate in Delta riding, a riding he represented for some years. Mr. Bowser heads the Conservative ticket in this city, and is not seeking election elsewhere.

In another house on the estate lives James A. Garland III., a brother of Charles Garland, who has accepted his share of his father's estate, made larger by the fact that the mother of the boys abandoned her rights in order to marry Francis C. Green after the death of her first husband.

## COMMITTED ON MURDER CHARGE

Steve Cupiluk Must Stand Trial For Brantford Killing.

**BRANTFORD, Nov. 29.**—After an all-day session of the police court Steve Cupiluk, boarding-house boss and Mr. Dolinski, were tried on charges of murder, while the other five Russians who had been held were released. Not until the charges were withdrawn against five of the prisoners and the latter were brought in as witnesses this afternoon was the case able to get to the facts of the case. Dolinski is held as the one who struck Vesseli Popov with the hammer, causing a fatal fracture of the skull, and Cupiluk as an accessory before the fact. Counsel argued that the case was one of manslaughter, and the magistrate concurred, but Crown Attorney Popov's death was the culmination of a row over cards.

## COP KEEPS HEAD COVERED IN COURT

**MONTREAL, Nov. 29.**—In the practice court here today, Royal Canadian Mounted Policeman William Jones, in charge of one Peiner, an immigrant who was appealing against his deportation proceedings, refused to remove his hat on the ground that he was armed and in charge of prisoners, and in such cases, he said, his orders and the custom were that he should not take off his hat in court.

Finally, on representations of the judge and clerk of the court, he consented to do so, but removed his hat on Saturday morning, a day after the trial. It is now felt that a binding rule will have to be given by the minister of justice governing such cases in the future.

## Held For Theft of Victory Bond

Ernest Listman Is Placed Under Arrest At Stratford.

**STRATFORD, Nov. 29.**—A police court case which promises to be of considerable interest began today, when Ernest Listman was charged with the theft of a Victory Bond. The case was adjourned until Tuesday afternoon. The case appears to be due to the fact that the box was missing. About a year ago, it is stated, a minister named Wilson was moving his household effects from Hamilton to Exeter by motor truck. When the goods arrived a box was missing. In the course of the investigation, the owner, and on examination it was found that the box contained a Victory Bond. Mr. Wilson failed to notify the banks, and the December and May bonds were cashed. The hearing of the matter, Chief Broadway notified the banks to be on the lookout for further cashing of the bonds. Listman presented a coupon at one of the local banks to be cashed. He was refused, and he was charged with the charge of theft preferred against him.

## Compromise Over Teachers' Salaries

Recommendation of Committee Is Adopted by Ingersoll Education Board.

**INGERSOLL, Nov. 29.**—At a meeting of the Ingersoll Education Board, a compromise was effected in connection with the recent request from teachers for an increase of salaries. The teachers' committee brought in the following recommendation, which was adopted:

"That all the teachers of the Central School receive \$50 flat increases from \$100 to \$150 per annum, including third-book forms, up to a maximum of \$1,000, with a maximum of \$1,000 for fourth-book forms, including the principal of the school. Beginning January 1, 1921, the salary of the principal of the school shall be \$2,500. This represents an increase of \$250. The salary of the teachers shall be \$100 each, also kindergarten teachers. The principal shall receive an increase of \$200."

## MONTREAL PLUMBERS ASK POLICE FORCE TO PROTECT THEM

**MONTREAL, Nov. 29.**—Owing to the continuance of attacks upon members of the Catholic and National Unions by striking plumbers, the central council of the Catholic and National syndicates has asked the police to protect them. The council of public safety, Lt. Col. Gaudet, asking the protection of the five strikers, has been granted and it is further understood that the strikers have been issued permits which may lead to arrests at any moment.

The strike of the plumbers here has been in progress for some weeks. The men are asking \$1 an hour and an eight-hour day, and they belong to the American Federation of Labor. ## WILL ASK FOR REPEAL OF ACT

One Day in Seven Measure Would Cost St. Thomas \$5,000.

**ST. THOMAS, Nov. 29.**—The council at a special meeting today named City Solicitor Doherty to be one of a delegation from other cities in the province who will meet Premier Durney on Tuesday to have the "one-day-in-seven-act" relative to fire departments, repealed at the next meeting of the Legislature. The act is a measure passed on January 1, 1917. The section, if made effective, would cost the city \$5,000 a year.

**CONSERVATIVES MAY CEASE EFFORTS TO RESTRAIN RAIL MEN**

Brotherhood Leader Warns United States Labor Board of Needed Action.

**CHICAGO, Nov. 29.**—Warning that the "ultra conservative" leaders of the railroad brotherhood would cease their efforts to hold their men in check unless some plan to adjust differences between roads and employees is found, was delivered to the United States Railroad Labor Board today by Warren S. Stone of Cleveland, grand chief of the Brotherhood of Railway Engineers.

Appearing before the board with officials of fifteen other recognized railway unions, Mr. Stone announced that, after being classified for seventeen years as an "ultra conservative," he had arrived at the point where he was through making excuses to the men.

He declared some plan must be found for getting results for railway employees. Mr. Stone told the board that he had tried to embody the decision of last July, under which railroad wages in the United States were raised \$300,000,000 in agreements with 25 railroads, but only four agreements had been signed.

The labor representatives joined in asking that the board hold a hearing to decide on the creation of national boards of adjustment which would hear and pass on controversies other than wage disputes.

## FREIGHT SHIPMENTS INTO CANADA MUST BE PAID FOR IN FULL

**MONTREAL, Nov. 29.**—A letter received by the secretary of the national branch of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association from the secretary of the Interstate Commerce Commission on the subject of prepayment charges by Canadian shippers over United States railroads, states that such charges from United States to Canadian points must be paid in full, including exchange, which today stood at 13 per cent, while exports from Canadian points to destinations in the United States must be prepaid, but must be paid for at point of destination, also in United States currency.

The position is that while the American Interstate Commerce Commission has decided that its jurisdiction does not run beyond the border, the Canadian board has decided that the Canadian Board of Railway Commissioners, and a decision is expected before long as to whether the Canadian part of the export haul should be paid in Canadian or United States currency.
