FUTURES ARE UNSTEADY
TRADING BECOMES DULL

Cables Are Firmer, But Chicago
Options Except Oats
Are Lower.

World Office,
Saturday Evening, Dec. 7.
At Chicago, Dec. 7, wheat closed 1/2c lower,
Dec. corn 1/2c lower, and Dec. oats
1/2c higher.
Winnipeg car lots to day, 300, last year
unchanged.
Liverpool wheat futures 1/4c up, corn
unchanged.

ST. LAWRENCE MARKET.

Receipts of farm produce at the St.
Lawrence Market on Saturday were large,
100 bushels of grain, 20 loads of hay, 1
load of straw, with about 100 loads of
mixed vegetables, poultry, butter and
eggs, in the north building, and large re-
ceipts on the basket market.
Wheat—Four hundred bushels sold at
100c; 200 bushels of fall sold at 95c;
Oats—Six hundred bushels sold at 85c
to 100c.
Hay—Thirty loads sold at \$18 to \$21 per
ton.
Straw—One load sold at \$18 per ton.
Butter—The market continues easy,
some selling as low as 25c per lb. by the
cask, and some as high as 30c per lb.,
but the latter price was only paid by spe-
cial customers for a specially prepared
article, the bulk of the butter sold at
from 25c to 30c and 30c, but there was
plenty sold for less than 25c per lb. in
the bulk going at 45c to 50c per
dozen.

Poultry—Receipts were large. The qual-
ity of ducks and geese was generally
good, turkeys not so good, and chickens
as a whole were poor—few lots of good
and many little better than skin and
bones. Prices held about steady at last
week's quotations, as follows: Turkeys,
12c to 15c; geese, 10c to 12c; ducks, 8c
to 10c; chickens, 8c to 11c; fowl, 7c to 8c.
Dressed Hogs—Market easy at \$12.50 to
17.50, the bulk going at \$15.00 per ton.
Pork—At 25c to 31c per bag.
Apples—Plentiful, and prices easy at
quotations given in table. Very nice
medium-sized Spys were offered at \$2.75
per barrel.

LONDON FINANCIAL CABLE.

Bank Failures in West Evoked Con-
flicting Opinions.

NEW YORK, Dec. 8.—The Post pub-
lishes the following financial cable from
London:

With private discounts more than 1 per
cent below the Bank of England rate, it
is conceivable that the bank's business
will be forced, and that an early reduc-
tion from the 7 per cent figure, maintained
since Nov. 7, may result. Otherwise there
is a strong disposition to maintain the
bank's present policy of resumption of
your banking machinery.

As to this, the bank failures announced
in some of the London papers, which
conflicting opinions. If we were
sure that they represent only a wedding
process in which the government's
banking department concurs, we should
be surprised that the market should be
in a state of such confusion. If, on the
other hand, the failures are the result of
a really serious aspect.
