Supreme Council Decides Germany Must Pay 226,000,000,000 Marks

ALLIES ARE UNITED IN CAUSE OF PEACE AS WELL AS OF WAR

Supreme Council Adjourns, Having Agreed on All the Points to Mutual Satisfaction—Germany Must Disarm and Pay 226,000,000,000 Gold Marks in Forty-Two Annual Payments, as Well as 12 Per Cent. on All Exports.

Paris, Jan. 30.—Full agreement on reparations, German disarmament and all other important questions was reached by the supreme council of the allies before it adjourned at 5.40 yesterday evening, to meet again in London on February 21.

Lloyd George Promises Britain Will Show Utmost Goodwill in Settlement. GERMANY MAY OBJECT

Mr. Lloyd George assured them that Great Britain would show the utmost goodwill in the settlement, as evidenced by the engagement made at the Hythe conference not to capitalize its share of the German indemnities for five years.
