Exports. Paris, Jan. 30 .- Full agreement on reparations, German disarmament and all other important questions was reached by the supreme council of the allies before it adjourned at 'clock yesterday evening, to again in London on Feb-5.40 o'clock

The greatest result obtained was; as M. Briand, the French premier expressed it after the closing session, "maintenance by the allies of a front as united in making peace as it was in waging war." Count Sforza, the Italian foreign minister, and M. Briand said the conference had resulted to the satisfaction of everybody concerned.

A protocol was signed approving A protocol was signed approving the reparations scheme as agreed by the special committee appointed by the council to consider the subject and also the report on the disarmament of Germany, as presented by the military committee. Under these arrangements Germany must disarm by July 1, disbanding all her civic guards not provided for in the Versailles treaty.
