

as last year, and which was devoted to the purchase of a prize cup for the second best aggregate score. This cup was won by Ensign Dillon, 34th Battalion.

A liberal prize list, in which nearly \$2,500 was offered in prizes; which comprized the Aldwell Challenge Trophy, the Brassey Cup, and the Cups presented by His Excellency the Governor-General, and the Lieut.-Governor of Ontario, the Silver Medal of the National Rifle Association, and a large number of Snider-Enfield Rifles and Carbines, with Ammunition,—drew together a number of representatives from some thirty affiliating associations. A record of the winning scores is to be found in the Appendix, from which will be seen, that the high average of former years is not only maintained, but in some cases increased.

The Wimbledon system of squadding, and a regular rotation of ranges, was adopted during the last meeting, with great success. Eighteen ranges were constructed, six first class, six second class, and six third class, beside the Pool, Time, and Running-man Targets. The marking was altogether by discs, and the Butts in the first and second class Targets, on the sunken system. The markers were principally discharged soldiers, and after a little practice, did their work well. No serious accident occurred. The thanks of the Association are due to Lieut.-Col. R. B. Denison and Major Otter, for their able conduct as Executive and Range Officers. The weather, during the first four days of the match was very favorable; on the two last days, a drenching rain spoiled the comfort of the competitors, although the firing was continued.

The Aldwell Challenge Trophy, forming the first prize in the Battalion match, was won by the 10th Royals. The Brassey Cup, the first prize in the Company Match, was won by No. 5 Company, 37th Batt. (Haldimand Rifles).

The liberality of the Grand Trunk, Great Western, and Northern Railway Companies, and of the Royal Mail line of Steamers, in carrying competitors to and from their homes at one fare, deserve the thanks of the Association.

To the Committee of Arrangements, Lieut.-Col. Dennis, as Statistical Officer, the Surgeons of the various City Corps who attended the Camp daily, and the Reporters of the *Globe*, *Leader*, and *Telegraph*, for their able and full account of each day's proceedings, the thanks of the Association must also be recorded.
