VOCATIONAL DAY SCHOOL TO OPEN ON SEPTEMBER 7

Students From Outside City Must Pay Tuition Fee of \$30

I. N. FANJOY GIVEN IMPORTANT POST

Appointed Physical Instructor and Head of Pre-Vocational Department

The Saint John Vocational day school will open on September 7 and the Vocational night classes will open on October 4. It was decided at the meeting of the vocational committee held yesterday afternoon, when authority was given for the issuing of a prospectus and application cards which will be distributed to pupils in the city schools before the end of the term.

With reference to fees it was stated that residents of Saint John would not be required to pay any fee for full time day courses. From non-residents a fee of \$30 a term, payable in advance, will be required. The law provides that the district from which the student comes shall pay this fee, and that the government will reimburse that district to the extent of two-thirds of the tuition fee.

The purchase of equipment and completing of staff appointments were matters considered and I. Newton Fanoj, of Young's Cove Road, Queens county, was appointed head of the pre-vocational department and physical instructor.

Dr. L. M. Curran, chairman, presided.

Others present were: T. H. Carter, Alexander Wilson, Thomas Nangle, John McKinnon, Fletcher Peacock, director; Dr. S. A. Worrell, superintendent of city schools, and A. Gordon Lavitt, secretary.

Prices submitted by three local dealers for typewriters were received, and it was decided to defer consideration to a later date.

U. S. BISHOP ONCE IN CANADIAN BATTLE

Episcopal Coadjutor of Connecticut Has Medal For Bravery Under Fire

TORONTO, June 18.—Rev. Dr. E. Campbell Acheson, who was recently elected bishop coadjutor of the Episcopal diocese of Connecticut, was once a soldier in the Canadian army and possesses a medal awarded him for bravery under fire. The bishop was born at Woodwich, England, and went to Ontario in 1881, where he attended the University of Toronto. During the second Riel rebellion he enlisted in the Queen's Own Rifles. At the battle of Cut Knife Hill, one of the important engagements of the rebellion, young Acheson, rescuer Tuesday, 25th, officer under heavy fire.

He was ordained priest at Toronto by the late Bishop J. A. Swaitman in 1888, and was consecrated suffragan bishop of Connecticut at Holy Trinity church, Middletown, Conn., three years ago. He now stands as bishop coadjutor, in line to succeed Bishop C. B. Brewster as the fifth successor of Bishop Seabury of Connecticut, the first Episcopal Bishop of the United States, who was consecrated at Aberdeen, Scotland, in 1789 by Scottish Episcopal bishops, England and New England at that time not being on good terms.

Bride Was Wife of George E. Keith, Millionaire Shoe Manufacturer

PASADENA, Calif., June 18.—Mrs. Elizabeth Archibald Keith, widow of George E. Keith, millionaire shoe manufacturer of Brockton, Mass., was married to Roland D. Archibald, her third cousin and secretary, at her home here this week. She is 45 and he 28 years old.

Mrs. Keith came to Pasadena five years ago on the death of her husband. Archibald has been her secretary for four years. The couple had planned their marriage for two years.

The bride was attended by her 14-year-old daughter, Eleanor G. Keith, at the wedding. Mr. Archibald's father and a brother Thomas, attended him.

The bride was given away by her brother, Arthur E. Archibald. The bride and groom are natives of Sydney Mines, N.S.

Californians Look For Wet July Fourth

SAN FRANCISCO, June 19.—One hundred thousand cases of liquor are being smuggled to California, rum runners stationed in "liquor lanes," prohibition authorities say. The Marion Douglas, a sailing ship from the Atlantic, is off Los Angeles with a cargo of about 15,000 cases, 7,500 of which were already landed. The Malahat, an auxiliary steamer, which has figured in several spectacular rum running battles, is off the coast, with 6,000 cases, and the British steamer Federals, formerly the Belgian Gertrude, is said to be carrying 20,000 cases. The large off-shore supply is available to meet the seasonal demand which reaches its peak on July 4 annually.

Dozen Men Hurdled From Beds By Bomb

SEATTLE, Wash., June 19.—A dozen men were hurled from their beds and several were knocked down by flying furniture when a bomb exploded in a Salvation Army social centre, where 40 persons were asleep or at work. A man was seen to peer into an engine room on the first floor of the three-story building several minutes before the detonation. He carried a bundle under his arm.
