YOUTH, AGED 13, SAVES LIFE OF BOY IN HARBOR

Frank Trecartin, Fully Dressed, Plunges in and Rescues George Daley

To the bravery of a 13 year old West Saint John boy another, aged six, owes his life, according to details of a rescue from the harbor on last Tuesday evening, which became known this morning.

George Daley, six year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Daley, King street, West Saint John, while playing with his companions fell off a wharf at the foot of King street, West Saint John, and had sunk for the third time, when Frank Trecartin, 13 years of age, jumped into the water, fully dressed, dove to the bottom, where the child was lying face down, brought him to the surface with difficulty, and took him to safety on the wharf. The water in the place was well over Trecartin's head.

The child was taken to his home near by, first aid rendered, and consciousness restored.

BRAVE BOY PRAISED

Young Trecartin is being highly praised for his quick action, which undoubtedly saved the child's life. Frank Trecartin took swimming lessons last year at the Y. M. C. A., and although not an expert swimmer, showed a spirit of bravery and coolness in his action. He is a son of Mrs. Laura and the late Wynman Trecartin of West Saint John, and is a pupil in Grade 7 of the new Albert School.

SEE THE FALLS

At high tide the water of the Bay Fundy reaches a higher level than the water of the Saint John River and forces its way through the gorge of the Falls, creating a waterfall running up river.

At low tide the water in the Bay becomes so much lower than that of the river, that the fall of water is reversed and flows down river into the Bay.

At half tide, when the level in the Bay and river are about equal, the Falls disappear entirely, and the water flows smoothly to the surface of a lake.

To fully appreciate this wonder of the world it should be seen at all three stages.

SAINT JOHN MAN AWAY FOR DUTY IN ARCTIC LAND

Constable Harold McMahon of Mounted Police Goes to Chesterfield Inlet

The other day there sailed from Montreal, as noted in the despatches at the time, the S.S. Bayrupert of the Arctic Circle, and among those on board was Saint John man, Constable Harold McMahon of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, son of Mrs. and Mrs. John H. McMahon of 18 Hospital street. His destination was Chesterfield Inlet, which is at the northern part of Hudson's Bay. He expects to be there for three years. There were two other officers of the Mounted Police on the steamship. All were going to relieve men who had been on duty in the north.

The Bayrupert is of the Hudson Bay Company's fleet. In addition to the police she carries supplies for the trading posts of Hudson's Bay, and there were also on board several missionaries of the Oblate order, who will join the mission in charge of Bishop Turquetil at Chesterfield Inlet to work among the Esquimaux.

SPORTS ON LAND AND WATER LABOR DAY

Chapel Grove Country Club Announces Plans—Organization Progressing Well

At the monthly meeting of the Chapel Grove Country Club, held last evening, reports of officers were read showing the club in a healthy financial condition, and list of membership still growing. This resort is fast becoming very popular as is indicated by the ever increasing number of visitors and vacationists.

The property has undergone considerable changes and now presents a very fine appearance. The tennis courts this spring were re-laid with hard clay and are now in first class order. A new bathing house, plot house, new piano and phonograph are among the more expensive improvements.

Plans for a bigger and better than ever Labor Day weekend celebration were discussed and in addition to the usual corn boil, masquerade, tennis tournament, baseball series and play-day field day and water sports of all kinds. Organizers have expressed their willingness to compete in addition to yachts, motor boats and canoes.

A big attraction is promised in a match race between West Saint John and the team of boats already entered for this event.

TAX RECEIPTS 80 PER CENT OF LEVY

Sum in Excess of Last Year's Payments But Proportion About Same

The Saint John tax payments for this year during the discount period, ended yesterday, were in about the same proportion of the total levy as last year, the chamberlain said this morning. The cash received was \$48,000 in excess of the amount taken in last year, but the increase in the levy made the proportion about the same.

There was paid in this year, including \$14,000 received in the mail this morning, \$1,281,922 and last year the amount received was \$1,233,816. In 1924 the amount was \$1,285,000. There was written off this year in discounts nearly \$65,000 and this, with the amounts written off by the Board of Assessors, brought the total collections for the discount period to about 80 per cent of the total levy.

A record was made yesterday in the number of payments and the amount paid. The number paying was 1,922 and the amount taken in was \$421,442. This with the \$14,000 received this morning brings the 1st day's receipts up \$45,442. Last year the payments on the last day amounted to \$407,000.

Evidence Is Given In H. Slovit Case

The preliminary hearing of Hyman Slovit, charged with receiving stolen goods knowing them to have been stolen, was resumed in the Police Court this morning, and, after the evidence of three witnesses had been given, was further set over until Monday morning at 10.30. The goods involved in the matter were stolen from the warehouse of A. R. Williams Machinery Company in April, and were valued by the company at \$400. E. J. Hennessey and W. A. Ross appeared for the defence.

Hyman Jacobson, a junk dealer, told of buying 504 pounds of brass, alleged to be stolen goods, from Joseph Jacobson, another dealer, paying his nine cents a pound for the fittings.

Lloyd Kennedy and Joseph Gaudet, two youths at present serving jail sentences for the theft of the goods, told of disposing of the brass to the defendant for \$17.50, and said at that time he asked no questions about it.

COMMITTEE TO CARRY ON

At a special meeting of the council of the Board of Trade, held this morning, A. E. Massie, G. E. Barbour, H. C. Schofield, and A. F. Paterson were appointed an executive committee to carry on the routine business of the board during the absence of the commissioner, F. MacInnes Scudlers, who is acting as secretary of the royal commission for investigation of Maritime claims. Several other small committees were appointed to carry on special branches of the work during Mr. Scudlers' absence.

2 WAR VESSELS COME IN AND ONE LEAVES

Patriot and Cape Town Arrive at Saint John—Valerian to St. Andrews

His Majesty's Canadian destroyer Patriot arrived here yesterday afternoon and docked at No. 4 berth, Sand Point, where she will remain for one week. Suitable entertainment will be provided for the officers and crew of the vessel during their stay in this port.

H. M. S. light cruiser Cape Town arrived today for a week's stay. The cruiser has on board ten men of the Saint John Company, R. C. N. V., who have been training for six weeks off Newfoundland. These men will be paid off here and several of them Toronto and Hamilton R. C. N. V. R. men will be taken on for a training cruise when the vessel leaves port.

Arrangements for a church parade on Sunday are being made when the officers and men of the Patriot, Cape Town and local R. C. N. V. R. will attend divine service.

H. M. S. Valerian sailed today for St. Andrews to spend a short time. H. M. S. Witvoria, which sailed yesterday morning for Digby, will remain there four days and afterwards will make stops at Yarmouth and Shelburne before arriving on August 2 at Halifax, where she will remain a week.

FAREWELL AND WELCOME

Before the Valerian sailed this morning she was visited by a number of strong, president, and Captain A. J. Mulcahy, vice-president of the Navy League for the purpose of saying goodbye to the officers and men.

The Navy League officials were heartily thanked for the hospitalities and the visitors while in port. A visit also was made to H. M. S. Patriot where a welcome was extended to the officers and crew of that vessel. The visitors were entertained by the officers while on board the ship.
